Starlin Presents Browsing Talk On Wednesday

Glen Starlin, acting head of the department of speech, will speak on "Drama and Television" at the Wednesday night Browsing Room lecture, 7:30 in the Student Union.

Starlin who came to the U. of O. campus in 1947. He received his B.A. at the University of Idaho and M.A. and Ph.D. at the University of Iowa.

He will outline some of the dramatic accomplishments of television and talk about some of the leading television playwrights before the Browsing room audience.

Starlin is the chairman for the planning of the Western Radio and Television Conference to be held at the University next year.

He will return this summer to the Ford Foundation's Educational Television and Radio center at Ann Arbor, Mich., on a special assignment. He has worked there as a specialist in program development.

The discussion after the lecture will be led by S.N. Karchmer, assistant professor of English.

German Pianist To Give Concert

Bernhard Abramowitsch, German concert pianist, will present a concert in the Student Union ballroom May 8. He will be assisted by George Boughton, associate professor of violin at the University.

The concert pianist studied with Paul Strecker in Hamburg, Germany, and came to the United States in 1936. Abramowitsch has been a soloist with both the San Francisco and Portland symphony orchestras. He has also presented concerts all over the west coast.

Tickets to the concert are free, but they must be obtained for admission. They will be available at the SU main desk.

Renaissance Meeting Scheduled Thursday

The spring meeting of the Pacific Northwest Renaissance conference will be held here Thursday through Saturday in the Student Union. College and high school professors from throughout the Northwest will attend.

An English Renaissance supper will open the conference. Philip Souers, head of the English department, will be toastmaster, and Oliver Willard, associate professor of English, will present a paper.

F. M. Combellack, professor of classical languages, will be chairman of the Lexicon session Friday morning. Edward O'Neil, assistant professor of classical languages, will participate in a panel discussion.

Presiding at the business session and conference luncheon Friday will be Quirinus Breen, professor of history and president of the group. Chandler Beall, professor of Romance languages, will be chairman of the Friday afternoon session. Arnold Elston, associate professor of music, will be chairman of a Renaissance music program.

Other University professors who will be leading discussions are C. G. Laird, visiting professor of English; E.C.A. Lesch, professor of English; E. B. Barnes, head acquisition librarian; Francis Reithan and Pierre Van Ryselberghe, professors of chemistry, and Bernard Crasemann, professor of physics.

Wilson, Profs To Attend Meet

President O. Meredith Wilson and three faculty members will attend a conference on heredity and family life at the Columbia Athletic club in Portland, May 4 and 5. Wilson will deliver the welcoming address Friday morning.

Will Drum, associate professor of sociology, general extension division and the university, will preside over the conference sessions as chairman of the Oregon Coordinating council on Social Hygiene and Family Life.

An address on the social and psychological effects of different environments on identical twins reared apart will be given by Ralph Huestis, head of the department of biology.

Curtis E. Avery, professor of education and director of the E. C. Brown trust for the university, will introduce and discuss a preview of human heredity.
