Morris Shines In Win Over Vandals

Bill Bowerman's Oregon track team, without the services of ace distance men Jim Bailey and Bill Dellinger, still had enough power to down the Idaho Vandals 78 2/3-50 1/3.

Two meet records were established even though the weather was bad. Jack Morris ran the 220-yard low hurdles in 23.5 to cut six-tenths of a second off the old record held by Bruce Sweeney of Idaho since 1954. The Idaho relay team of Benny, Johnson, Bauscher and Olson ran the mile in 3:23.5, breaking the record held by Oregon since 1954.

Jack Morris continued to shine for the Ducks' as he defeated Wilbur Gary in the 100 yard dash with the time of 10.1. Idaho took a clean sweep of the mile and 2-mile, usually Oregon's strongest fields. Warren Hohanson won the mile with a time of 4:33, and Milt Riggers won the 2-mile with the time of 10:26.

Netters Defeat Idaho, Cougars

Oregon's tennis team won their first two matches of the Northern division campaign by downing Idaho and Washington State Saturday.

The Ducks, coached by Col. Earl Ralf, downed Idaho 6-1 in the morning, and came back to defeat Washington State 4-3 in the afternoon match. This double win gives the Ducks a 2-1 record, as they lost to Washington last week.

Idaho was able to get only one doubles match from the Oregon team. Dave Cummins and Jack Hieber downed Rich Butler and Bob Gorman 6-3, 4-6, 1-6. Jim Larperter of Oregon was the only Duck forced into an extra set. He defeated Joe Smith, 7-9, 6-1, 6-3.

The Cougars provided more trouble for the Ducks, as they took both doubles matches and one singles match for their points. Oregon had to count on singles play to get their points. Oregon 6, Idaho 1.

Coach Don Kirsch's Northern division second place baseball team will play host this afternoon to the cellar dwelling University of Washington Huskies at three o'clock on Howe field.

Two wins in the series are a "must" for Oregon if they are to successfully defend the division title which they won last year. At present, the Ducks are a full game behind WSC, the division leader who has completed the first half of its conference schedule with only one loss. Two Cougar wins in this week's Idaho series coupled with an Oregon defeat would put WSC almost beyond reach in the standings.

Washington is, moreover, a potentially strong club despite their anemic record. After losing four games to WSC they have won three of their last six games and are on the upgrade.

In playing Oregon today and Tuesday, the Huskies will be completing a Willamette valley trip after which they will have played both Oregon and Oregon State. Friday, they lost a 16-15 slugfest to Oregon State but bounced back Saturday to beat the Beavers by four runs, 9-5.

The probable Oregon starter today is lefty Don Lane who tops Oregon's conference pitching with a 2-1 record. Tuesday Stan Dmochowsky, who turned in a brilliant seven inning relief job against WSC last week, will probably get the starting nod.

Bailey talked on, "The four minute mile used to mean something, but not anymore. Bailey broke it, now everybody'll start doing it."

Couldn't Believe

"Who told me I'd broken it? Landy, I think. He came up and said, 'You've done a 3:58!' but I couldn't believe that."

A writer wanted to know about coaching. "Bowerman's helped me a lot. He holds me in. Why, Monday I wanted to run a three-quarter trial, but no, he wouldn't let me. The same Tuesday, I thought he was a nursemaid, not a coach. But he was right."

Dellinger spoke up, "Landy worked too hard," (the Los Angeles press had made quite a fuss over his daily long, hard workouts right up to race time). "Yeah," Bailey added, "but he was tired too. Phone calls and interviews half the night and all day."

Bailey picked up a chart of the race, "All this data — I suppose I should be interested, but I never could be." He turned toward Dellinger, "You had pret-

ty good lap times (62.1, 62.1, 61.4, 63.2), until that last one." And to a bystander, "I know he's got a 4:03 in him."

Dellinger Watches

Dellinger just shook his head, "I don't know, I just didn't run. It felt like a race, but at the end I wasn't tired at all. I guess I just got too interested in watching it."

A bystander asked if he could see it from back there. "Sure, good depth perception," said Lon Spurrier, the last place finisher, as he passed. "You're top pilot material now."

Somebody asked if he liked the Coliseum track, reminding him that he had run his 4:05.6, previous best of his career there last year. "That's right," Jim replied, "this is the second time in my life I've done better than 4:10, and both here."

Track Tradition

"There is something about a track. There's one in Sydney — I've never been beaten in the half there — I get a kick out of just walking on it. There's something about the tradition of it. It's where England meets Australia in rugby and all that. I get a feeling I can beat anybody whenever I run there."

Dellinger looked out across the track and remarked, "I wonder how Landy feels — to come how many thousand miles and get beaten by another Australian."

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PCC Gives Huskies Two Year Probation

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Faculty athletic representatives of the Pacific Coast conference Sunday placed the University of Washington on two years probation and slapped on other restrictions which had the effect of assessing a \$52,000 fine against the university.

The action was taken as the result of investigations by Victor O. Schmidt, conference commissioner, of the Greater Washington Advertising Fund, more commonly known as the "Torchy Torrance slush fund."

Schmidt said that he made three trips to Seattle to inquire into operations of the slush fund in February and March and ran up against a blank wall as far as Torrance, Roscoe "Torchy" Torrance, one time assistant graduate manager at the university or any of the Washington athletes still eligible for competition was concerned.

Schmidt said that "some few" athletes who had completed eligibility admitted having received "under the table" payments from the slush fund.

Schmidt said he was unable to get any figures, but other sources said the amounts ranged up to \$60 a month.

Schmidt said the university had been warned "several years ago."

The penalty included the two years probation, which in effect limits the university entirely to dual athletic competition and prevents post-season participation in any sport for the 1956-57 and 1957-58 seasons.

The statement added:

"During the period of probation the University of Washington shall not be entitled to or permitted to participate in the distribution of the receipts

of the Rose Bowl game, including the receipts for radio or television rights for the Rose Bowl game, and all other receipts which may be included in the total Rose Bowl receipts."

That provision, over the two year period will cost the UW \$26,000 a year or \$52,000.

In a separate action the athletic representatives disclosed the existence of a second fund for athletes at the University of Washington, known as the Evergreen Educational foundation, and the disqualification of several members of the Husky football squad who had received loans from it.

The Evergreen foundation was reported to the conference meeting by Prof. Donald Wollett, Washington representative, who also reported that the university itself had declared the athletes ineligible.

Although it operated outside the conference ruling and was illegal from that standpoint, the foundation had been set up in good faith and the loans made to the athletes in an open and above-board manner, said Dr. Glenn Seaborg, conference spokesman and University of California representative.

The conference hence has ruled that the athletes who received Evergreen loans, which were definitely loans and not handouts, will be returned to eligibility as soon as proof of repayment of the loans is made, Dr. Seaborg said.

The two wins raise the Ducks ND dual record to two wins no losses and one tie (with Washington). Oregon faces British Columbia U. at Eugene Tuesday and travels to Corvallis Friday to take on the Oregon State Beavers in the next to last Northern division match.

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
