

Senate Hears Reports Of Co-op Board, Others

mittee, and the exchange assembly director. All reports given were approved.

ASUO public relations chairman Dick Janik reported that he and Hinkson had worked this year to get a nationally-famous entertainer to the campus to promote fund-raising for the Olympic games, but that no success resulted.

Traffic Safety Study

Most recent activity of the public relations group is a letter sent to Eugene's mayor V. Edwin Johnson, asking for traffic study concerning the corners of 11th and Alder, and 13th and Alder. Janik said.

In connection with public relations, Hinkson said he and other ASUO officers are trying to promote a banquet honoring track star Jim Bailey, which would also be used to raise needed Olympic funds. The banquet would be held this term, if negotiated.

Dick Barker, chairman of the Co-op board, said that another ten percent rebate of student purchases is probably again this year, and summarized activities of this year's board.

Most important of these were the approval and enactment of self-service in the campus bookstore, and the purchase of one-fourth of a block including the Westgate shop, the Side, and Bill Baker's property, back to the alley by Fehly's studio.

In a special report, Kip Wharton asked that approval of the Model UN charter be withheld until next year's senate can read a portion of the group's charter, which was not sent. According to Wharton, the part covering the "nature" of the Model UN was not included.

Ken Kesey, exchange assembly director, reported that two more schools will be visited by the traveling show, and that response of all schools included in the itinerary has been favorable to the show, which had entirely original music and script.

WUS Made \$1400

Jim Carter's, WUS report showed an estimated \$1400 total of funds raised, with faculty solicitations not yet completed.

Carter said the vodvil show made almost \$400 less than last year's show, and attributed this to high overhead, fewer high-school guests, and members of the audience who didn't pay admission to attend.

Crusade—Not So Often

A possibility of holding a Crusade for Freedom drive every two years recommended by Nan Hagedorn, who acted as co-chairman of the initial Crusade drive here this year.

An interim report on campus parking by Harry Hanna revealed that a five-story proposed parking lot in the Fiji lot met lack of response by the ASUO cabinet, that this project was felt to be unnecessary and it lacked sufficient funds to be carried out.

Classifying Cars

Hanna proposed recommendations favoring a system of classifying campus-registered cars, with three sets of stickers designating faculty, on-campus students and off-campus students' cars. The lots would then be properly designated to coincide with these classifications, he proposed.

Kefauver Accepts, Stevenson Rejects Speech Invitation

Estes Kefauver, Democratic candidate for President of the United States, accepted an invitation from Eugene Democratic groups to appear on the same platform with Adlai Stevenson in Eugene, on May 15.

According to an Associated Press dispatch Monday night, Senator Kefauver accepted the invitation Monday. However, Stevenson had already turned down the offer through his Portland campaign manager, it was reported in Sunday's Register-Guard.

The two candidates are now scheduled to speak separately in Eugene, but both will be here on May 15.

UO Grad Finishes Officer's Training

David E. Jeremiah, a 1955 graduate of the University, was graduated recently from the navy's Officer Candidate school at Newport, R.I.

Ensign Jeremiah was one of 390 who successfully completed the 18-week course.

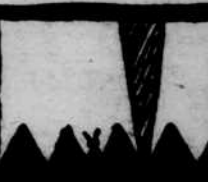
