

Music School to Hold Brass Choir Concert

The University music school will present a concert by its brass choirs in the school of music auditorium at 8 p.m. Thursday. The performance is open to the public.

Selections on the program will be Fanfare pour preceder "Le Peri" by Paul Dukas; Music for Queen Mary by Henry Purcell; Two Ayres for cornets and trombones by John Adson, and Concerto No. 2 in E flat by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart.

Other numbers will be Morgen-music for brass by Paul Hindemith; two pieces for horn quartet by Nicolai Tcherepnine; trombone quartet by Stanley Bassett; quintet in B flat by Robert Sanders; Providebam Dominum by Oriando di Lassus, and Canzona Duceimi Toni by Giovanni Gabrieli.

The brass will play both as ensembles and as massed choir.

Students participating in the concert will be cornets, Marshall Pallett, James Albert, Vondis Miller and Richard Mayer; horns, Larry Drake, Alan Casebourn, Robert Fulberson, Robert Ransom, Ervin Royer, and Joy Read; trombones, Delmer Aebischer, Gary Donnell, Glenn Benner, and Fred Hull.

Other performers will be baritones, Robert Zimbleman, Keith Leighton, Walter Buehning, Warren Schad; tubas, Gary deBroekert, John Hansen, and Don Thurber; and accompanist, Donna Peterson.

White Awarded Fulbright Grant

David Olds White, graduate student in education, has been awarded a Fulbright scholarship to enable him to study educational administration at the University of Koeln in Germany next year.

Approximately one thousand grants for graduate study abroad in the academic year 1956-1957 are being awarded under the International Educational Exchange program of the Department of State.

As provided by the Fulbright Act, all students are selected by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, the members of which are appointed by the President of the United States. Students are recommended by the campus Fulbright committees and by the Institute of International Education.

Students wishing to study abroad for the 1957-1958 academic year should apply between May 1 and November 1, 1956.

Honors Courses Schedule Exams

Tostberg Named Danforth Fellow

Robert Tostberg, senior in history, recently received word that he is the recipient of a Danforth Foundation fellowship. Tostberg was previously awarded a Woodrow Wilson fellowship for one year of study in history at the University of Wisconsin. The Danforth fellowship will go into effect upon completion of the Wilson grant.

Tostberg did undergraduate work at the University of Missouri in 1947-48. He became a commissioned officer in the Navy. At this time he decided to return to college and become a University professor.

The Danforth foundation he will receive includes an annual summer camp at Camp Minnawana, Mich., which he will attend in September.

The foundation itself is an educational trust fund for students preparing themselves for a career of college teaching, and who have specialized in undergraduate fields of natural and biological sciences, social sciences, humanities and other fields.

Report Indicates Early Life Here

Don't take our word for it, but that new subdivision south of town probably had tenants 80 centuries ago.

L. S. Cressman, head of the University of anthropology department, and Edward S. Deevey Jr., director of the geochronometric laboratory at Yale, reported Friday to the Society of American Archaeology, meeting at Lincoln, Nebr., that tests on radioactive carbon indicate that men lived in Oregon 8000 years ago and that the area has been continuously inhabited since that time.

The studies were made with an "atomic calendar" at the Five Mile Rapids on Oregon's side of the Columbia river. Cressman directed the field work, which yielded fossils and charcoal, while Deevey tested the materials for radioactive carbon, the newest scientific method for fixing dates.

Cressman has investigated the archaeological site as far down as the 8000-year level. He has found fossils and such instruments as a polished antler tip which had been used for cutting; the base of a harpoon prong, and a flint knife, shaped by percus-

sion flaking—a process dating back a million years.

Fossil remains of condors were found at the more ancient levels—from 7500 years to the 8000 years. Along with the condor fossils were found those of 624 different and individual birds, including such types as the bald eagle, gull, gyrfalcon and magpie.

Fossil remains of fish and seals were also found. Cressman explained that these suggest that the Oregon area studied was in an "estuary-like condition and that the food economy of these early inhabitants was already adapted to a maritime status."

Carol David, senior in liberal arts, has been awarded a \$1,250 scholarship for study in Latin America during the 1956-57 academic year.

The award was presented by the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs. It was announced Friday at the closing session of the organization's convention in Portland.
