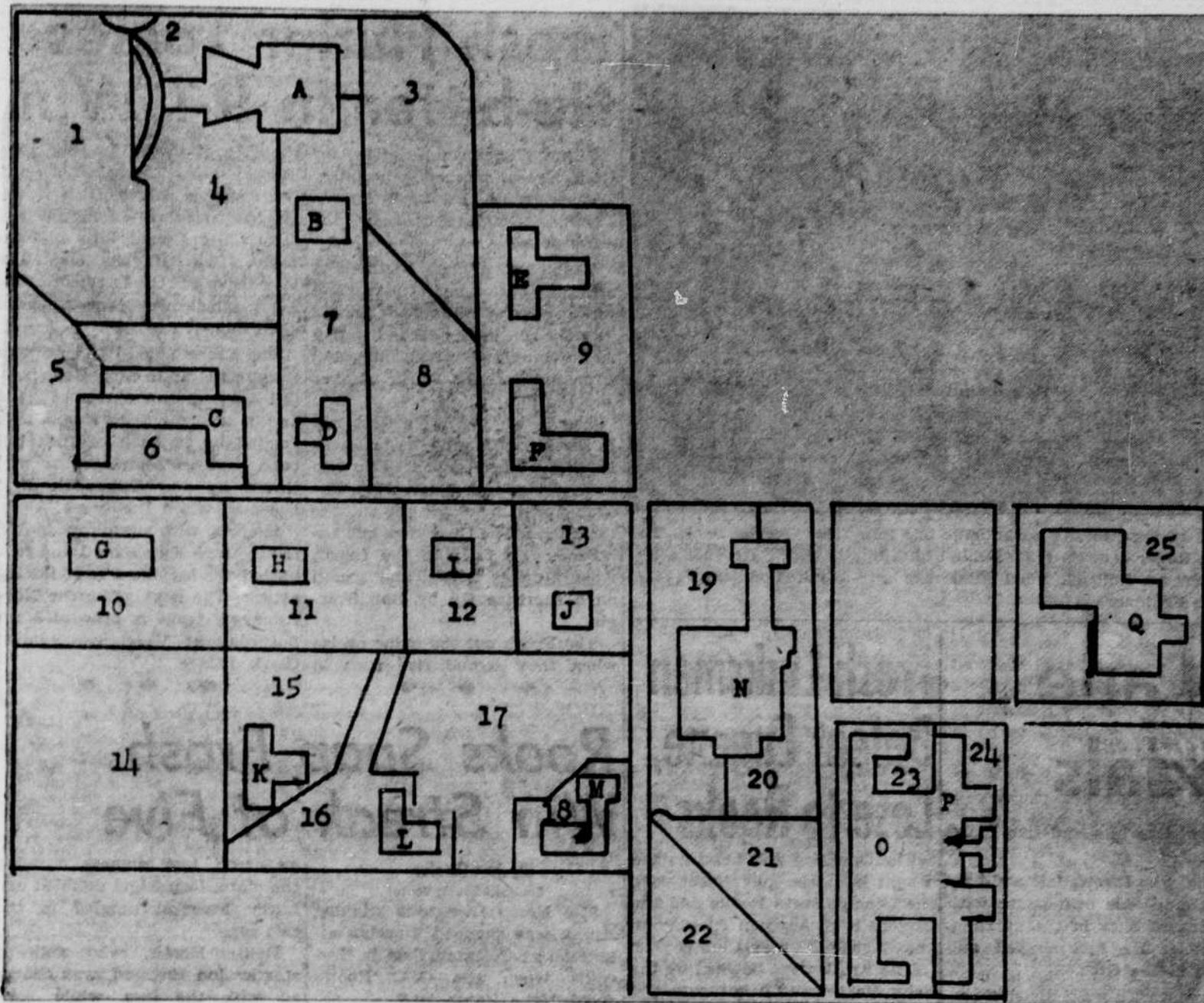

Germany Offers 60 Scholarships

The Federal Republic of Germany is offering 60 special scholarships for American graduate students for study in Germany during the 1956-57 academic year.

Candidates in any field of study, except undergraduate medical studies, are eligible to apply for these awards, but preference will be given candidates under 35.

Awards include round trip ocean transportation, tuition at any institution of higher education in West Germany or West Berlin, and a nine month allowance.

Candidates must be citizens of the United States and must have a bachelor's degree by the time of departure, or if in the fields of art and music, equivalent training; a good command of the German language; good academic record; personal references; and good health.

Application forms may be obtained from the U.S. Student department of the Institute of International Education, New York, and all applications and supporting documents must be filed by June 1.

Tokyo Professor To Give Lecture

Yoshikatsu Ogasawara, professor of geography at Meiji university in Tokyo and director of Japan's Land Use Survey of the Geographical Survey institute, will give a lecture Monday at 8 p.m. in the second floor gallery of the University Museum of Art.

Professor Ogasawara's topic will be Geography and Art in Japan, a comparative study of the Kamo and Yamato river valleys and the West Kanto plain as influencing distinctly different regional cultures and their arts in Japan. There will be possible references to works of art in the Murray Warner collection of Oriental Art in the University Museum of Art. Slides and a special exhibit will accompany the lecture.

This lecture is being sponsored by the Far Eastern Studies committee and is open to the public.

Quackenbush Named SU Board Assistant

Don Peck, who was this year's board treasurer, announced his resignation from the board shortly after Fadeley was elected. Peck, who had been nominated along with Fadeley for the position, said that he would have to take an outside job next year to provide needed income. After careful consideration, he said, he had decided that he could not serve on the board because of this fact. The board chairman's salary would have provided sufficient income for Peck.

New board chairman Fadeley served on the SU board this past year as a representative from the school of law.

Expansion Problem Told

He said after Wednesday's meeting that he hoped the new board would do as well as this year's board.

He added that the "major job of the SU Board for the coming year will be support of a dynamic outdoor recreation program centering on the Millrace."

Don Peck, in announcing his resignation, spoke to the board about their "one problem:" expansion. He said the SU program will have to expand along with University enrollment.

"Every committee in the SU program was set up with the idea that it could carry out a year long program..." he said.

"It is up to the board to see that it is carried out... and look continually for more things to do."

Then, with Fadeley presiding as chairman, the board selected the rest of its officers.

Besides Lolly Quackenbush, Junior Marcia Mauney and

Sophomore Dick Hyder were nominated for the assistant chairman's spot.

Jeanne Scales and Barbara Berwick were nominated for secretary. Hyder and Bajema were the treasurer nominees. Hyder and Miss Scales were both nominated for directorate chairman.

Retiring officers of the board: Jack Socolofsky, chairman; Dick Gray, assistant chairman; Lolly Quackenbush, secretary; Don Peck, treasurer; Lucia Knepper, directorate chairman.

Twenty-two old and new board members attending the joint meeting.

Before the selection of officers, reports by Treasurer Peck and Directorate head Lucia Knepper were given. Peck announced that "with changes in this year's budget and in the proposed budget, we will spend what we have and nothing over it."

At the conclusion of the meeting, personnel committee chairman Dick Hyder reported briefly on the SU banquet that will be held May 24 at 6 p.m.

Costumes, he said, for old board and old directorate members will be ready soon.
