

# Student Library Contest Prizes Awarded for Thirteen Collections

Book prizes were awarded to thirteen students Saturday, from among 93 entries received in the annual student library contest sponsored by the University Co-op store, the Association of Patrons and Friends of the University library, Mrs. Henry Trump, House Librarians association, and Prouty's Old Book store.

The five categories were undergraduate student's general library; undergraduate specialized; graduate student's general; graduate student's specialized; and special paper-backed general or

specialized, for both graduates and undergraduates.

First-prize winners received \$25 in books, second will receive prizes of \$15 in books, and third-place winners will get \$10 in books.

### Winners Named

Undergraduate: George Gerhard, Jr., senior in psychology; John Walsted, senior in history, second; E. D. Toepfer, junior in architecture, third. Squire Bozarth, sophomore in liberal arts, honorable mention.

Undergraduate specialized: Nak Kwan Kim, junior in mathematics, mathematics library, first; James Hanns, senior in architecture, second with an architecture library; Mrs. Orville Colver, special student in English, third with a Japanese literature collection. Honorable-mention winner was Robert Bureker, junior in English, with a special library on "Americana."

Graduate general: Harold Bauman, graduate in history, general American life and thought for first place; Paul Davey, graduate in Physics, second; Harry Widman, graduate in painting, third; Thomas Grave, graduate in general studies, honorable mention.

Graduate specialized: William Rouff, graduate in history, history of American foreign rela-

tions, first; Victor Millstein, graduate in psychology, special clinical psychology, second; James Mackey, graduate in biology, natural history library, third. Honorable mention went to Harold Bauman, with an early modern library.

One prize of \$10 cash was offered in the paper-backed competition, and it was awarded jointly to Orville Colver, graduate in sociology, with a special thought; and sociology collection, and to George Gerhard, Jr., with a general collection.

Honorable mention in the paper-backed division went to E. Baughm Lee, graduate student in political science, with a collection on Eastern affairs.

The prizes will be awarded Saturday night at the annual banquet of groups sponsoring the contest. Head University librarian Carl Hintz will present awards at the banquet, at which all prize-winners will be guests of the Association of Patrons and Friends.

## Japan Is Topic Of Ogasawara

Yoshikatsu Ogasawara, professor of geography at Meiji University in Tokyo, Japan, will speak tonight at 8 p.m. on "Regional Geography and its Art in Japan." The lecture will be given in the mezzanine gallery of the museum of art.
