Zoology Course Is Listed for Summer

A 9-hour course in general zoology (201, 202, 203) will be offered this summer at the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology at Charleston, on Coos Bay.

Representatives of all major groups of animals can be studied there, according to the University department of biology.

The course will run from June 18 to Aug. 10.

Other courses, including invertebrate zoology, biology of fishes, marine ecology and planktonology will also be offered on a six week basis, June 18 to July 27, with a two week post session for those desiring it. For advanced students there will be opportunities for individual work or research.

Stephenson Plans To Teach at LSU

W. H. Stephenson, professor of history, will participate on the summer school faculty of the Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge.

Stephenson taught at the university from 1927 to 1945 and was dean of the college of arts and sciences for part of that time. This summer he will teach history of the south, history of the old south, and American history.

In the month's interval between the completion of summer school and the beginning of the fall term here, Stephenson plans to do research.
