

Brandenfels Permanent President of '56 Class

Martin Brandenfels, senior class president, was unanimously elected as permanent president of the class of 1956, at a class meeting held Tuesday at Commonwealth hall.

Jill Hutchings, this year's ASUO secretary, was unanimously elected permanent secretary. Brandenfels appointed an executive board, to co-ordinate class activities in alumni years, as his first official duty in office.

The board consists of Bud Hinkson, outgoing ASUO president; Gordon Rice, outgoing Emerald editor; Patty Fagan, who has been senior class representative; Anne Ritchey, this year's Emerald news editor; Sally Ryan, Emerald editorial page editor; Kip Wharton, retiring class vice-president; Sam Vahey, ASUO vice-president and Emerald managing editor; Dick Gray, assistant Student Union board chairman this year; Kent Dorwin, outgoing Inter-fraternity council president; and Jane Bergstrom, this year's Associated Women students president.

In other business at the meeting, Brandenfels announced that the class picnic will be held June 8 at 3 p.m., at Armitage park.

Karl W. Onthank, associate director of student affairs, told class members of the opportunities open through the University's graduate placement office both now and many years after graduation.

Bass Dyer, alumni director, told the class about membership dues and privileges of the alumni association, and said later that class reunions will be held every five years. Up until the 25th reunion, they will be held at Homecoming, and after that during graduation weekend, he said.

Appointments to next year's Emerald staff were announced at the annual banquet Tuesday by Bill Mainwaring and Loretta Meyer, editor and business manager for next year.

Emphasize Millrace

In their interview Kirkpatrick and Miss Landon said that they didn't want the All-Campus Sing held during Homecoming. They also expressed a desire to use the Millrace as much as possible in Homecoming festivities and work closely with the rally board in organizing Homecoming spirit.

The senate also selected Tom Waldrop as exchange assembly director for next year. Waldrop, a sophomore in speech, was the only petitioner for that position.

Model UN

Steve Chemysch appeared before the senate to urge passage of a recommendation to the budget board that the board reimburse this year's delegates to the Model United Nations, held recently in Corvallis.

Chemysch asked for \$204.50.

After lengthy discussion the senate decided that, since this year's Model UN was not essentially a ASUO function, it would recommend that the board not make the appropriation.

A committee was appointed by new ASUO President Darrel Brittsan to look into next year's Junior Weekend. Working with chairman Doug Basham, ASUO vice president, are Louis Blue, Dick Allen and Sue Walcott.

John Whitty, in his last senate meeting, spoke to members on some items he wanted to leave in their minds.

Whitty Advises

Two things, he said, that make poor student government are lack of critical attitude, and a tendency to agree with the first person who says anything during a discussion period.

In the past, he said, some things have passed through the senate that shouldn't have.

Whitty commended the new senate, urging them to retain the critical attitude they had displayed so far during the meeting.

The senate voted to authorize President Brittsan to act in its behalf on the awarding of spring term sports letters.

Brenn, Hill, Named

Bruce Brenn was selected to be the new senate's sergeant-at-arms. Phil Hill was named senate parliamentarian.

Bob Loeffelbein, next year's football yell king, asked the senate to urge their living organizations to send interested members to serve on the rally committee.

Near the meeting's end, new President Brittsan gave a brief talk. He noted that this year's senate had made quite a record and that the new senate would have to work hard to duplicate it. He said he thought that the new senate was a "very fine group."

Senate "keys" were awarded to outgoing senate members, including those who will be a part of the next senate. Hinkson awarded these also, with a farewell remark to each recipient.

"One of Best"

DuShane, who spoke at the beginning of the brief program, told the 1955-56 senate that "this year in many ways was one of the best" in his eight years at the University, citing growing evidence of student initiative and responsibility as a trend toward more effective and more meaningful student government.

DuShane referred to the abo-

ment of Associated Greek Students party, and resulting campus political changes, as "noble in purpose and commendable in objective," saying that it was a step toward "obliterating the lines of suspicion and dislike" that had in the past marked Greek-Independent lines among students.

"Laughing"—An Honor

Speaking of charges that this year's senate was a "laughing senate," DuShane said the group could wear the description as a "badge of honor," and that significant legislation passed showed the accomplishments of the group.

Dean Morris, before presenting the outstanding senator award, expressed his pleasure in serving with the student legislative body throughout his two years.

Hinkson directed brief remarks to the group he has worked with this year, thanking them and saying that the association would be one he will never forget.

Belko Tops List For Coach Spot, Despite Denials

Idaho State's Steve Belko still appeared to be the man to replace Bill Borchers in Oregon's vacant basketball coaching job Thursday, despite repeated denials from University athletic department officials.

Events up to Thursday pointed to an announcement Sunday of the new coach, although department spokesmen remained mum on the subject.

In an Oregon Journal by-lined story Wednesday Al Gould continued to insist on Belko's leading the field of applicants for the position. Athletic department officials, however, continued to deny the accuracy of Gould's list, first released Monday, which included Ralph Miller of Wichita university, Bill Strannigan of Iowa State, Eddie Hickey of St. Louis university and Belko.

Wednesday Gould reported the removal of Strannigan from the four and noted that Belko was still in Eugene.

Harris, meanwhile, was reported in an interviewing conference Thursday morning, increasing speculation that the appointment would be made very soon.

Harris maintained his no comment status on the situation, except to express the hope that his decision could be made before Sunday if possible.
