Members of the group include Zoltan Szekely and Alexandre Moskowsky, violinists, Denes Koromzay, violist, and Vilmos Palotai, cellist. During their stay here, the quartet will present three formal evening concerts at 8 p.m. on Thursday, July 5, Tuesday, July 10, and Tuesday, July 17, in the school of music auditorium. These performances will be free to the public.

In addition the Quartet will do some private teaching and coaching and give several lecture demonstrations, also free to the public.

Each member of the quartet was a famed soloist before joining the group. Szekely, a pupil of the Hungarian master Jenő Hubay, is the violinist to whom Bela Bartok dedicated his only violin concerto.

Russian-born Moskowsky, a pupil of the Hungarian teacher Leopold Auer, was formerly a professor in the Amsterdam Conservatory. Before entering his professorship, Moskowsky was a soloist in several European orchestras.

Koromzay, also a pupil of Hubay and first prize winner at the Vienna Conservatory, became known in Europe through his sonata recitals. Palotai was previously a cello soloist in the Bremen Philharmonic and professor of cello at Prague.

The quartet was formed in 1935 and made its American debut in 1948.

## Placement Office Assists Many Job-Hunting Students

Results of graduate placement for graduate and undergraduate students at the University have been released, according to Karl Onthank, associate dean of student affairs and director of graduate placement.

A total of 850 students will receive B.A. degrees, of which 550 are men and 300 are women. Approximately 700 will eventually enter the labor force. Three hundred of the men will go into the armed forces, and 200 women will enter the business or teaching fields.

One hundred members of the graduating class will enter graduate study or elsewhere.

This year, over 100 business concerns had representatives interviewing students. Over 100 additional telegrams and telephone calls offered employment to students. Additional job opportuni-

ties were handled by other University departments.

Participating in the job placement program were 1000 students, of both graduate and undergraduate levels. Three hundred others were counseled by the department, and 250 previous students, generally those returning from the service, were assisted in finding employment.

The department does not place persons directly, but serves as an intermediary between the prospective employers and the students. Onthank said many students have obtained jobs with large and outstanding businesses. Even beginners were able to receive good pay.

Onthank reported that there were plenty of job opportunities for liberal arts graduates, and that women, who often were not consistent members of the labor force, had plenty of job offers.

## Museum To Open Soon; Many Exhibits Planned

More than 40 exhibits of worldwide and Northwest material will be displayed in the University's Museum of Natural History, which is scheduled to open soon.

Exhibits are presently being set up, and the museum, which is located in the anthropology building, will be open to the public as soon as work is completed. Museum officials estimate this to be about three weeks.

According to J. A. Shotwell, museum curator, the museum is "probably the only museum of natural history connected with a university on the coast." Opening of the museum will be the culmination of a two-year project started when the museum material was moved from Condon hall.

### Research Facilities

Included in the building are research facilities, offices and storage space for other museum materials. Shotwell emphasized the fact that only a small part of the total composition of museum collections will be on display, as research is the main pur-

pose of the museum and the displays are secondary.

Displays are of a diversified nature, but are mainly grouped in the fields of pathology and anthropology. Oregon and Northwest minerals are included. A special exhibit shows the effect of ultra-violet and normal light on fluorescent and phosphorescent minerals.

### Habitat Groupings

Scheduled for later completion, when funds become available, are three large habitat groupings. Included will be an antelope group from the Hart mountain area, a mammal group from the McKenzie, and an animal group from the Willamette valley, examples of the three extremes to be found in the state.

Other displays feature Indian pottery and relics, Oregon reptiles, birds, meteorite examples and fossils. Included in the research material is the University herbarium, which is also considered outstanding on the Coast.

A large projector and screen is included in the supplementary

museum material and will be used for slides and movies relevant to displays. A lounge and couches for discussion groups and visitors are included in the facilities.
