## Wife Wouldn't Believe It When Allen Made Olympics

"My wife wouldn't believe me when I called her up and told her about winning and that I was going to be a member of the U.S. Olympic wrestling team. She said something like, 'Oh, that's swell.'"

That anyone, especially his wife, would be amazed at the achievement of the quiet Oregon student is somewhat unbelievable, when Lee Allen's wrestling record is heard.

Among other things, he was undefeated in four years of Oregon high school wrestling competition and is the only four-year state champion in the history of Oregon prep grappling. He has won three Amateur Athletic Federation championships, the National AAU Greco-Roman championship, the Pacific coast championship, has been voted the outstanding wrestler in four tournaments, and has a table covered with medals and trophies.

The only member of the wrestling team from the coast, Allen said that he was "the happiest and the tireddest he had ever been after the final match." His toughest match in the trials at Legion

Stadium in Hollywood, however, was against the NCAA champion from Pittsburgh, Joe Perry. He beat Perry by a unanimous decision (Olympic matches are scored like a prize fight, with three judges giving points) and won his final match by a pin over the Pan-American champ in three minutes of the second round.

The day after his victory, Allen and the other members of the team were introduced at Los Angeles Coliseum and got to see Jim Bailey win the historical mile there. Said Allen, "It was one of the biggest thrills of my life to be out there in front of forty thousand people and hearing myself announced as a member of the Olympic team."

Allen will be going to Australia as a member of the free-style team. The other group, new U.S. Olympic competition this year is Greco-Roman. According to Allen, the Europeans have dominated the latter style, and the U.S. is attempting to pick up more points by entering a team in this event. The major difference between the two styles is

that in the Greco-Roman, no holds are permitted below the waist.

About the trip, Allen is "Really excited about going to Australia, especially with the plane trip and a brand new wardrobe bought by the Olympic committee. The team will meet on October 18 to start working out, and will leave for Australia in time to arrive there for the competition, which will be from November 26-29."

Concerning his chances at the Olympics, Allen was non-committal. "The team should do pretty well in both divisions, but the world's champion from Turkey will be back in my weight this year, and I hear he's pretty good."

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## Keller, Maddox, Lane Highlight UO Season

Hard hitting by Johnny Keller and Terry Maddox, and Don Lane's pitching, furnished statistical bright spots for Oregon's 1956 baseball squad, despite its failure to win the pennant for the first time in four years.

Keller, twice all-Northern division at shortstop and a certainty again this year, won the league's batting crown with a mark of .451. Maddox, who hit .423, broke the Northern division record for runs-batted-in, slamming home 26 in 13 games to top Jay Dean's (OSC) 1955 record of 22.

### Lane Shines

One highlight in the Ducks' inconsistent pitching staff was Lane, the Modesto, Calif., sophomore. The left-hander compiled a 4-1 record with three complete games, two shutouts and a league-leading 1.06 earned-run-average.

Lane's four victories tied him for ND leadership with Al Guidotti (4-1) of OSC and Washington State captain Jerry Bartow (4-2). Maddox, the division's pitching sensation for the champion Ducks last year, lasted only 2 2/3 innings in three starts.

### UO Stats High

The Oregon team as a whole outdid its opponents in statistics in compiling an 8-5 record. The team batted .277, with five regulars batting over .300, against .234 for the opposition. The Ducks outscored (102-70) and outhit (125-102) the season's opposition, but left a whopping total of 110 men on base.

In individual departments Keller led the team in hits with 23, and he and Ken Bond each scored
