Accidents Mar Hunting Opening

Three persons were dead—two from heart seizures and one from a gun shot wound—one hunter was missing, and another was recovering from a bullet in the shoulder as the first weekend of deer hunting season ended Sunday night.

Still missing in the rugged, wooded area near Lake of the Woods, 15 miles west of Klamath Falls, was mill worker Donald Barron, 20.

He left on a hunting trip with three companions Friday night and became separated from them.

Search Widespread

He was the object of a widespread search by the Klamath Air Search and Rescue Unit, volunteers, and bloodhounds brought to the area from Dallas.

Another hunter, Raymond A. Wallace, 57, of Florence died of a heart attack Sunday while hunting about 10 miles southwest of Florence.

He was the second heart victim of the season. Halbert Belchs, 48, of The Dalles, suffered a fatal seizure while tracking a deer in the Cherry Heights area near The Dalles Saturday.

The first fatality of the season was recorded Friday night. James F. Miller, 23, St. Helens, was accidentally shot and killed by a companion while they were preparing for a hunting trip.

Aurora Man Wounded

Clifford Zoner, 22, of Aurora, was the first non-fatal gun shot victim. He was mistaken for a deer by another hunter and suffered a bullet wound in the shoulder. The mishap occurred in the Ochoco woods of Central Oregon.

Two other hunters, reported lost earlier, made their way out of the woods unharmed Sunday. They are Carl Mitchell of Klamath Falls who was lost near Bonanza and Thomas Chapman, 45, Oregon City, who was lost near Estacada.

Dolls on Exhibition In Library Lobby

Dolls from foreign countries, dressed in costumes from their native country, are presently on exhibit in the circulation lobby of the library.

The dolls are from the collection of Mabel Wood, head of the home economics department. Included in the display are dolls from South Africa, Greece, Rumania, Egypt, Latvia, Japan, China and other lands.

Miss Wood has collected many of the dolls herself while traveling abroad. Her collection now numbers between 50 and 60 figurines.

The exhibit has been combined with a display of books on the countries represented and will be on display until Oct. 16.

Police Nab Transient On Knife-Murder Rap

PORTLAND, Sept. 30—(AP)—Leroy Dedrick, 32-year-old transient, was booked on a murder charge here early today after the knife punctured body of a woman was found in the kitchen of her Williams Avenue district home.

Police reported that Dedrick also was wanted at San Francisco on a first degree murder warrant in a fatal shooting there Nov. 19, last year.

Detective Jack Sizer said that witnesses told him that Dedrick and a half dozen other persons were in the home of Mrs. Nehoma Seegar at about 1 a.m. playing cards and eating.

Dedrick became loud and profane and Mrs. Seegar told him to leave. According to witnesses this enraged Dedrick, who rose from his chair and attacked Mrs. Seegar, wounding her 14 times in the back, chest and arms.

Dedrick, picked up later by po-

lice, said he had been drinking and had "blacked out."

San Francisco police reported that Dedrick was wanted there in connection with the fatal shooting of Alcie Beese and the critical wounding of Frank Hall before several witnesses in a Folsom street apartment in Dec., 1955.

They said Dedrick had called there to demand information on the whereabouts of his girl friend, Inez Decatur.
