### **McKay Discusses** Aid to Education In Campus Talk

Doug McKay, in top off-thecuff speaking form, told a University of Oregon audience Thursday night that there is "no hard and fast rule," when asked if he believed in Stevenson's recently expounded plan of giving scholarships to deserving U.S. young-

McKay, who formerly served as Secretary of the Interior and as Governor of Oregon, was speaking at a coffee hour program sponsored by the campus Young Republicans and the coffee hour forum committee.

"Most young people today have living groups from 11 to 12. a reasonably good opportunity to get an education," he said. He of dancing at each women's group added that many large companies are giving scholarships for those qualified and in need of them.

"I'm strong for education for those who want it and those who are capable of it," he said.

Approached about federal aid to education, McKay said he was for President Eisenhower's education bill which failed in Congress earlier this year, McKay said this was for a five-year federal aid plan of building. "There is a crying need for educational facilities," he said.


"I am not in favor of federal aid to education as such," he maintained. He emphasized that he didn't want to see the federal government infiltrating and running local school systems.
