

Bruins Whip Ore.; Duck Fumbles Costly

An alert UCLA defense, strengthened by the decision of four semi-eligible senior linemen to play, forced Oregon Webfoots into seven fumbles and capitalized on a recovery on the one-yard-line to down the Ducks 6-0. A crowd of 32,097 cheered the Bruins as they won their first PCC start.

The winning touchdown came when Bruin left end Dick Wallen recovered a wild pitchout on the Oregon one. After being set back on an offside penalty, UCLA tailback Don Long went into the end zone on the fifth play of the fourth period, with the lone score of the fumble and penalty laden contest. Harry Mondale blocked the kick for the extra point.

Jim Shanley, ace Oregon halfback, electrified the home crowd

by returning the opening kickoff 89 yards to the UCLA one, where he was brought down by right end Hal Smith. However, the brilliant effort was nullified by a clipping penalty on the Oregon 17 and the Ducks wound up on their own two.

Three plays made only seven yards and Morris kicked out of bounds on the UCLA 49. The Bruins failed to gain and Doug Bradley punted poorly out of bounds on the Oregon 24. Left halfback Jack Brown gained three but Tom Crabtree fumbled twice, the first for an eight-yard loss and the second recovered by UCLA end Hal Smith on the 19.

Fullback Barry Billington made nine and Bradley picked up three for a first down on the Duck seven. Tailback Doug Bradley gained two, Billington recovered his own fumble for no gain, Bradley hit Smith out of the end zone then completed to Bergdahl. But Jim Shanley stopped the UCLA quarterback on the one and Morris kicked out to midfield.

Chuck Holloway, 162-pound Bruin halfback, made a brilliant return to the Webfoot 14, where he was tackled by Shanley. Bergdahl gained two but passes by Bradley and Don Long were incomplete. On fourth down, Oregon end J. C. Wheeler racked up Long on the seven and the Ducks took over.

After two short gains, Jack Crabtree passed complete to Captain Phil McHugh, who made a one-handed circus catch on the 30. Shanley and Morris took the ball to the 41 for a first down, then Shanley and Brown for another first on the UCLA 48 as the gun ended the first quarter.

A fumble by substitute right halfback Len Read ended the Oregon drive. UCLA failed to gain and Wilson punted 47 yards to Phelps, who raced to the Webfoot 27. Oregon could not gain and an offside penalty nullified Phelps' punt to the UCLA 16. Holloway returned the next kick to the Oregon 45 but a clipping penalty put it in play on the Bruin 47.

Again the Oregon defense held and Shanley returned the UCLA punt 21 yards to the Duck 31. But Morris was forced to punt to Holloway when the Ducks could not move. From the UCLA 31, two plays made a first down on the 45. Long made a first down on the Oregon 43 and then passed to Hal Smith on the Oregon 16. Long drove to the 10, Farber

gained three, Long was held for no gain twice and the Ducks took over. It was the Webfoots goal line stand of the half.

Shanley gained 10 and 11 to move the ball out to the 32. Morris ran to the Duck 45 as the half ended 0-0.

After the Bruins had made a first down on their own 44 to start the third quarter, Jack Brown intercepted a Bradley pass and returned it 14 yards to the Duck 40. On third down Jack Crabtree passed 19 yards to Jim Shanley on the Bruin 41. Three plays put it on the 35, the Webfoots deepest penetration of the night, and Morris kicked out on the UCLA 15.

The teams exchanged punts, with Morris kicking poorly off the side of his foot out of bounds on the Oregon 44. Two passes from Bradley to Bergdahl moved the ball to the Oregon 15 but two holding penalties put the Bruins back on the 38. From there two passes missed fire and Bradley punted to the Oregon seven.

Then came the fatal fumble after Morris had gained two for a first down on the 17. After the kickoff, Morris fumbled but redeemed himself by intercepting a pass on the Oregon 31. The Ducks couldn't get going and gave up the ball. Long made several beautiful runs but after he had gone to the Oregon two, clipping put it back to the 20. Long could only get to the 14 on three plays and the Ducks took over as time ran out.

But instead of footballs, it was 30-gallon garbage cans from the windows of a local hotel.

Police Lt. Larry Heischman said Stanford guards Don Carswell and Donald Manoukian started heaving cans, which were located near service elevators, from the nineteenth floor of the Deshler-Hilton hotel onto the roof of the Palace theater.

By the time police caught up with them, Heischman said, the husky pair had tossed out a half dozen cans while working their way down to the ninth floor.

The two players were held in city jail overnight and then turned over to Stanford Coach Chuck Taylor today to return with the Indians to California.

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WSC, Idaho Students Fight after Grid Tilt

MOSCOW, Idaho, Oct. 7 (AP)—Comparative calm settled over the Palouse Country today with only an uncounted number of cuts and bruises remaining as a memento of the pitched battle yesterday between students of the University of Idaho and Washington State College.

The tears, which came after Moscow police officers fired teargas guns to quell the riot, are dried up.

The students, part of a crowd of 16,000 which watched the annual football game boiled around the goal posts for nearly an hour in an effort to cart them home for souvenirs. The gas sent them scurrying for the exits.

WSC won the 57th game between the traditional rivals 33-19.

Police fired the tear gas in an effort to break up fist fights on the field. Dr. Ralph Alley, University of Idaho physician, said he treated about half a dozen students for minor cuts and bruises inflicted before the crowd dispersed.

A Moscow police officer, one of about eight assigned to keep order at the game, said his men held off as long as possible before firing the gas, hoping that the excitement, a usual post-game event when these two schools meet, would die out. But when the mob remained on the field, the officers felt gas would be the quickest and safest method of clearing the stadium before anyone was seriously injured.

One sports writer, however, who was with other reporters in the stadium press box when the grey cloud rolled through the air, suggested a bit ruefully that "tear gas does not distinguish between participants and bystanders."

Bill Boni, sports editor of the Spokesman-Review, also commented that there was some discussion among the working press, who presumably should be classed as noncombatants, that they should be awarded some sort of citation for "gallantry over and above the call of duty."
