NATO Group Sponsoring Fellowship for US Citizens

A scholarship and research fellowship program is being sponsored by the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to further the study of the common traditions, historical experience and present needs of the North Atlantic community.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens, and preference will be given to candidates with some graduate training. A knowledge of the language will be necessary for placement in non-English-speaking countries.

Scholars will be selected on the basis of their scholastic record, the institutions at which they plan to pursue their studies, and their subject of study. Grants will be 500,000 French francs for one academic year of study plus travel expenses.

Applicants to Be Screened

The Institute of International Education will screen applicants for the scholarship program. The research fellowship applicants will be screened by the Confer-

ence Board of Associated Research Councils. The remaining candidates will be submitted by the Department of State to NATO's international selection committee which will make the final awards to applicants from all NATO countries.

Awards Distributed

The international selection committee will aim at an equitable distribution of awards among the members states.

The aim of the NATO fellowship program is to further the idea of an Atlantic Community by encouraging the study of the historical, political, legal, social, linguistic, economic and strategic problems that will reveal common traditions, experience, and needs of the NATO area.

Candidates for the limited number of NATO Scholarships should apply to the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York City, N.Y.

Drill Won't Count As Active Service

Weekly and weekend drill periods of active reservists will not count as active duty service for purposes of draft deferment under the six months active duty deferment plan.

The deferment will be allowed to all reservists and national guardsmen who have served the six months active duty period, with two-week summer camps and short duty schooling tours allowed to qualify for the deferment period.

Regular weekly drill periods will not be allowed as credit for the six-months period, however, as was erroneously reported earlier.

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
