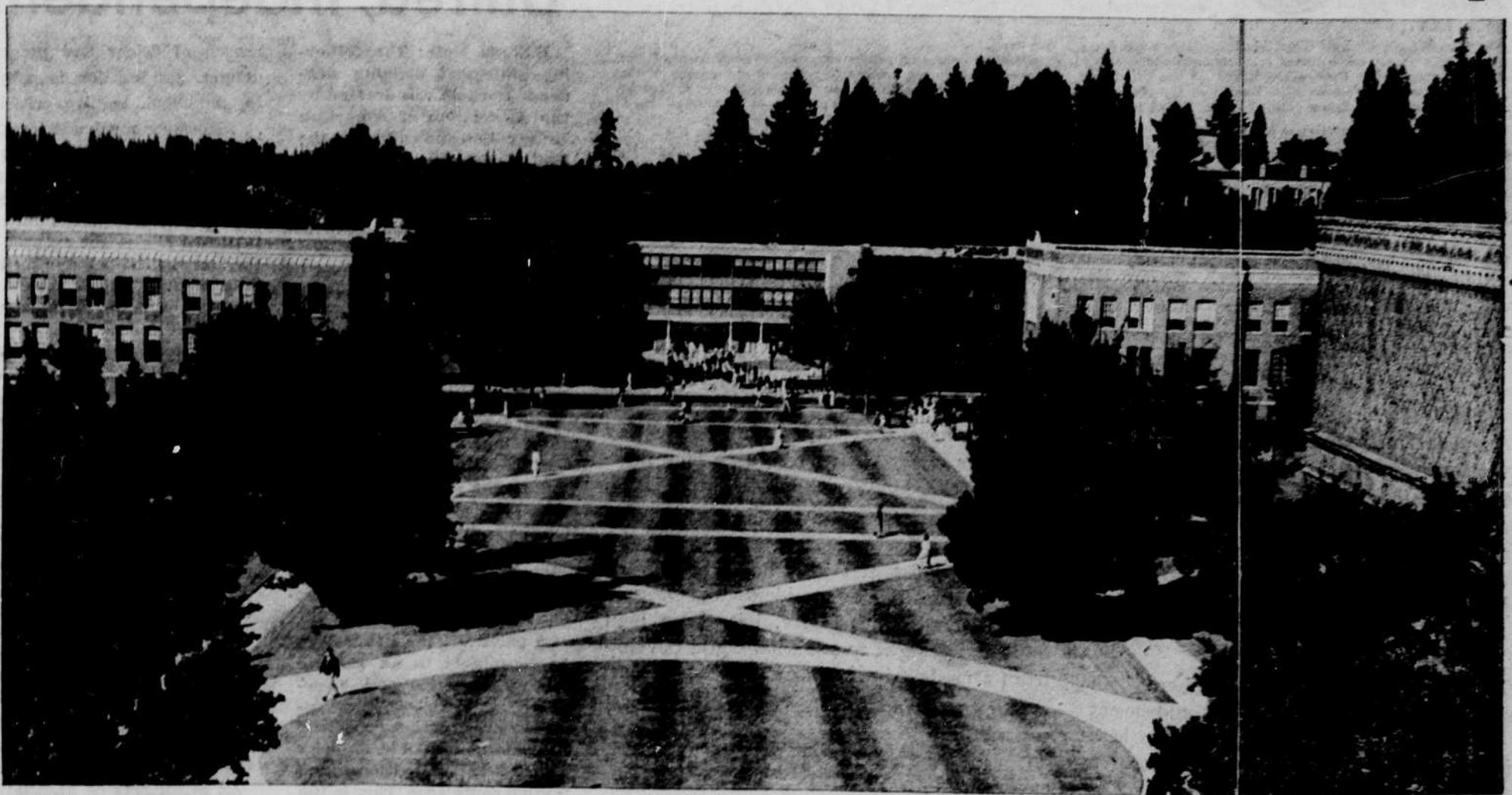


Since 1876 ... A University
