"To act as an enforcing arm of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission is not the job of the ASUO Senate. However, the fact that drinking at football games has become a serious problem on many campuses has led the Senate to evaluate the situation at Oregon. In order to avoid more serious consequences, the Senate goes on record as disapproving drinking at football games, and requests the cooperation of the student body in helping to achieve this goal."
