

Morse Defends Actions

"smear booklet." He said figures compiled by a Congressional Library research team support his "remarkably good voting record."

On 116 "key" votes, Morse said he was "voted or recorded" in 95.7 per cent of them. Recorded, he said, meant he was either present, excused or "paired" with another senator. A senator can "pair" with another senator who will cast his vote opposite to the first, he said, so that one of them

can be absent from the Senate. Morse said he actually voted on 86.2% of the "key" votes. His voting average of all bills was 84%, he said, while he had a 93% record "voted or recorded" on all bills.

Morse said that 60% of his bills have been adopted, incorporated in committee with other bills, or taken care of by administrative order.

Trying to Do 'Snow Job'

Morse said McKay is "guilty of

the scandal of Al Sarena." He said "the Oregonian, the Register-Guard and Grants Pass Courier are trying to do a snow-job on Al Sarena, but the issue is so hot that the snow melts right off it."

"I have never bent my knee to any editor in the state," Morse said, and declared the Register-Guard belongs to the "hate squad." Noting that the Emerald supports McKay, Morse said the Emerald is a "chip off the Salem Capital-Journal."

Gov. Elmo Smith will speak to a student assembly Thursday at 1 p.m. in the Student Union. All 1 p.m. Thursday classes will be excused for the assembly, but will be held Tuesday at 1 p.m.

Morse Coffee Hour Reflects Opinions

The people of the United States "still maintain a great love for the President as an individual," but they "recognize that the President just doesn't know what is going on in the administration," said Wayne Morse, Oregon's Democratic candidate for U.S. Senator.

Morse made this statement Tuesday at a coffee hour forum in the Student Union in support of his belief that the Democratic Party's presidential candidate will be the victor in the forthcoming election. Vice President Nixon "will cost the President several million votes" said Morse.

Explains Party Change

The Senator accused the Republican party leaders of selecting the party candidates in the 1952 convention so that the convention might be expedited. This expedition of the party nominees for candidacy of the vice presidential position was one of the reasons Morse gave for shifting his party loyalty.

Responsibility of the present administration's failure in foreign

policy rests on the shoulders of Dulles, said Morse.

Dulles' foreign policy pattern "goes around the United Nations instead of through it," said Morse. "This kind of policy costs us friends all over this world." Morse stated "you weaken the United Nations Charter every time you go around it instead of through it."

Morse advocated taking such crises as the Suez situation and the Formosa problem to International Court. Morse said that he thought the United Nations should decide such problems. He did not state what course of action he thought the United Nations might take on the Suez crisis.

Proposes Trusteeship

The Senator said he thought the UN would place Formosa in a trusteeship if the problem of that island's defense was taken before International Court, which is what he has wanted to do with Formosa ever since the question of that island's sovereignty and defense first arose. Morse further said that "no one has sovereign rights over Formosa at this hour."

False Alarm No. 2 Sounds at Johnson

A fire truck was called to Johnson hall late Tuesday afternoon after several persons had reported smelling smoke.

After searching for the fire, the firemen found the source of the smoke. A piece of string in a cigarette ash container had become ignited and was smoldering, according to W. L. Thompson, director of public services.

The false alarm is the second of the term, the first occurring when smoke from a faulty ventilator in the University Press caused an alarm to be sounded bringing fire engines to Allen hall.

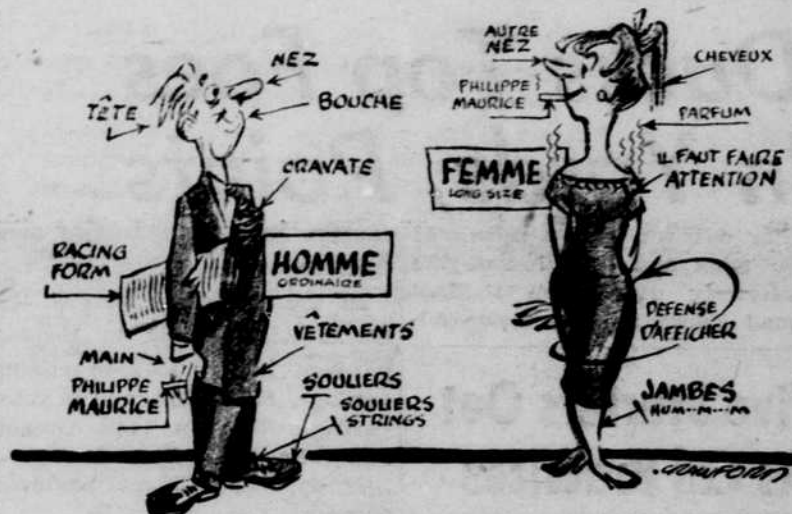
