Edmund Cykler, professor of music history, will present a program on the folk music of Austria tonight at 7:30.

U. S. Rejects Russian Arms Offer

LONDON (AP)—The Soviet Union called Monday night for joint American-Soviet military intervention—backed by the United Nations—to stop British-French "aggression" in the Middle East.

Premier Nikolai Bulganin made the appeal in a message to President Eisenhower, Moscow Radio reported.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5 (AP)—The U.S. government rejected as "unthinkable" a Soviet suggestion that the two powers join forces and stop the Middle East fighting by military intervention.

Moscow also announced that Soviet Foreign Minister Shepilov had sent a message to the United Nations Security Council urging it to render military and other aid to Egypt.

Bulganin's letter said:

"The United States has a strong navy in the zone of the Mediterranean. The Soviet Union too has a strong navy and a powerful air force.

Combination Said "Sure Guarantee"

"The joint and immediate use of these means by the United States and the Soviet Union, backed by a United Nations decision, would be a sure guarantee of ending the aggression against the Egyptian people and the people of the Arab East."

Bulganin charged that France and Britain attacked Egypt "without any reason."

Ike Demands Withdrawal

The Soviet premier's message was reported only a short time after Moscow announced receipt of a letter from President Eisenhower to Bulganin demanding withdrawal of Soviet troops from Hungary and free elections there.

More Fighting in Hungary

Meanwhile new street fighting was reported in Budapest Monday apparently threatening the promised withdrawal of Russian troops from the Hungarian capital.

A rebel-held radio at Miskolc said the street fighting erupted this morning. Reports from correspondents in the capital last night said some revolutionaries still were refusing to surrender their arms until the Russians leave.

Coupled with accounts of continued fighting in Budapest came reports that Russia was sending

more troops into Hungary.

A correspondent for the Hungarian news agency MTI reported from Nyiregyhaza that Rus-

sian troop reinforcements were crossing the Soviet-Hungarian border at Zehony. He gave no indication of the number involved.

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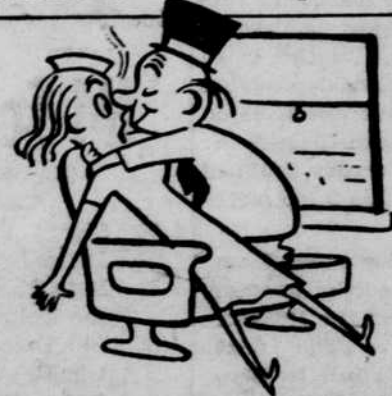
