Adlai 'Knew' of Loss Days Before Election

Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel and walked across the street to the Conrad Hilton to tell hundreds of mournful followers:

"To you who are disappointed tonight, let me confess that I am too. But we must not be disheartened, for 'There is radiance and glory in the darkness, could we but see, and to see, we have only to look.' "

A burst of applause welled up over the ballroom. Women wept openly. Men got out their handkerchiefs and blew their noses furiously.

This was a moment such as could only come at the hour of defeat for a presidential candidate whose followers hold him in endearment.

Stevenson, it may be said now, had known for days that he couldn't whip Eisenhower this year, just as he had known in advance the popular general of World War II would overwhelm him in 1952.

Maintained Optimism

But he breathed outward optimism, up until the end, making the toughest fight he could for a man whose scholarly tastes gave him little taste for some of the tough things he felt he had to say.

He finally went all out on the health issue on the eve of the election when he said what the politicians had been urging him to say from the beginning.

He suggested that President Eisenhower could not serve out a second term and that Vice President Nixon "would probably be president within the next four

years" in the event of a Republican victory.

That remark was not aimed at Eisenhower so much as it was at Nixon.

But, as he confided to reporters and friends after his confession last night, he couldn't have beaten Eisenhower anyway, especially after the war began in the Middle East and the people became convinced they had to keep a general in the White House.

Ike Wires Loser In Thanks for Pledge of Help

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Wednesday wired defeated Adlai Stevenson thanks for Stevenson's "pledge of cooperation."

Eisenhower sent the telegram to Stevenson's home at Libertyville, Ill. It was the President's first act Wednesday following his landslide election victory.

The defeated Democratic candidate made his promise of cooperation in conceding defeat and congratulating the winner.

Eisenhower's reply said: "I'm grateful for your message of good wishes. In these difficult and uncertain days it is heartening to have your affirmation of the fact that the people of our country are united."

"I appreciate greatly your pledge of cooperation for the immediate future and for the four years that lie ahead."

Democrats Elected To State Offices In Washington

Washington voters elected a complete slate of Democratic state officers Tuesday.

Albert D. Rosellini won the office of governor to head the list of eight Democrats swept into top offices at Olympia. The Seattle attorney and state senator defeated Emmett T. Anderson, Tacoma printing executive and the state's retiring lieutenant governor.

Also elected were John A. Cherberg, former University of Washington football coach, who won the lieutenant governor's race, and Victor A. Meyers, former lieutenant governor who won a very close victory in the secretary of state battle.

Initiative 198, the "right-to-work" measure that would have banned the union shop in Washington, was defeated 2 to 1.

The measure, which touched off one of the most extensive and expensive campaigns in the state, was one of three state-level propositions the voters rejected.

Four other measures, including Initiative 199 to reshuffle the state's legislative districts, were approved.
