

Proposal Would Alter Elections

While freshmen ballot on class officers Wednesday, the whole student body will vote on the passage of a proposed amendment to the ASUO Constitution.

The amendment, official notice of which is printed in today's paper, would place candidates for ASUO and class presidencies on separate ballots from those for Senator and class representative.

Under the present system all candidates for class office appear on the same ballot and students vote preferentially, by numbering candidates according to their preference. Such a system frequently allows candidates for class president to get the president, vice-president and one representative posts, thus allowing the election of only one representative candidate.

The amendment would also eliminate a clause concerning the non-existent campus primary.

In order to pass, at least one third of all students registered at the University must vote Wednesday. Of those voting, two thirds must vote to accept it.

Quartet to Play In SU Ball Room

The Julliard String Quartet will appear Friday evening at 8 in the Ballroom of the Student Union under the sponsorship of the Failing Lecture series. Tickets may be procured at the SU free of charge.

The Quartet, composed of Robert Mann, Robert Koff, Raphael Hillyer and Claus Adam, has recently returned from a tour of Europe. Vienna critics reported that the Quartet "took the public by storm," while Salzburg Festival critics reported that "the quartet played Beethoven with unforgettable splendor and Haydn with miraculous lightness and grace."

The amendment failed to pass last spring because the required one third did not participate.

Passage of the amendment is favored by Darrel Brittan, ASUO president, and Doug Basham, ASUO vice-president. No member of the Senate has voiced opposition to the measure.

Bowerman Picks Topic of Speech

"50,000 Years of Athletics," has been selected as the topic by Bill Bowerman, University track coach, for his Student Union assembly speech to be given today at 1 p.m. in the Student Union Ballroom.

Elaborating upon his speech topic more fully, Bowerman stated that his speech will "trace track and field from the cave man to modern olympics, or from Achilles to Bailey."

At present Bowerman is serving as president of the State Coaches Association. He is going as a spectator to Australia for the Olympics, and was invited to go to Pakistan to work with their track and field team.

Instructor at the University for eight years, Bowerman is an assistant professor of physical education, assistant director of athletics and head track coach.

He has also coached the Pacific Coast Conference track team that met the Big Ten track team, and has coached such greats as Dellinger, Bailey, Reiser, Rasmussen, and Dave Henthorne.

Following the completion of undergraduate work at the University of Oregon, Bowerman did graduate work at the University, at Columbia University, and at the University of California. Approximately ten years of teaching at a Medford high school preceded his graduate work.

Freshmen to Choose Officers Tomorrow

Freshmen will go to the polls Wednesday to choose their class officers for the coming year. Graduate students will also select a graduate student representative for the ASUO Senate.

Nineteen men are running for the office of freshman class president, and 16 men and women are competing for the freshman

class representative posts. One grad student is running for the graduate student Senate post.

Voting will be held from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday at the Student Union, Co-op, Friendly hall, Commonwealth hall, Straub and Carson.

Freshman candidates are running for the offices of freshman class president and two representative posts. The presidential runner-up will become freshman class vice president.

Rules Listed

Electioneering rules which govern the election are as follows:

1. No sign, poster, or other promotional material shall be tacked, nailed, or otherwise secured to trees and shrubs of the campus in such a way as to penetrate the bark.

2. Use of sound equipment, rallies, car parades in and around the campus is limited to the following hours: noon to 1 p.m., 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., 10 p.m. to 10:30

The Experiment in International Living is a summer program designed for U.S. students wishing to live abroad for one month as members of foreign families. Informal group trips will be taken to other parts of the foreign country with students from both the U.S. and other countries.

Experimenters go abroad in mixed or all-girl groups of ten, composed of members of the same age, representing different sections of the U.S. and diverse interests. A choice between approximately 15 countries in all parts of the world is offered.

Applicants for the program, among other qualifications, must be between 16 and 30, have a satisfactory academic standing, and be in good health. All students wishing more detailed information have been asked to attend the lecture.

THE INSIDE STORY

Reveals Lipstick Riot Facts

This is a year of hoaxes. And last Thursday night the University of Oregon was handed the biggest hoax of the year: "The Great Lipstick Riot."

What looked like a "spontaneous outburst of female passion" against the Order of the O was actually a planned scheme to drum up Oregon spirit.

But it got out of hand—way out of hand.

Was to Be Smaller

The riot was originally to have been a smaller demonstration than it turned out to be.

Bob Prall, a member of the Rally Board and Order of the O, casually suggested to members of the frosh rally squad that they "retaliate" against the "O" men—"like they did two years ago."

The frosh rally girls were led to believe that this was a tradition, according to Marlene Perkins and Sharon Hewitt, both frosh rally girls.

This was the story that was

told to Golda P. Wickham, dean of women.

Mrs. Wickham said that she had talked to approximately 50 freshmen and was convinced that the girls were fooled into actually believing that it was a tradition.

Prall said that in talking to the girls he was trying to get some spirit up and that "we needed something to get the kids excited."

Organizes Leadership

From there on in, things worked like a regular "chain of command."

The frosh rally girls whipped into action and organized Carson hall. They were told to wear pedal pushers and have lipstick ready for Thursday night.

The only thing that Prall had in mind for Thursday night, he said, was this:

The girls would "jump on the seal and run around on the grass" and thus arouse the wrath of Order of the O members.

But things didn't work out that way.

The girls spotted the football team at the training table in the SU. Wham! Pretty soon, after the milk and steak had been cleaned

up, \$150 worth of damage had been done.

Expected Something

Order of the O members had been tipped off in advance as to what would happen—or what was supposed to happen.

They had been warned to "look out for a retaliation Thursday night."

As halfback Jim Shanley said, "we expected that they would rebel . . . but not as much as they did."

Sophomore halfback Charlie Tourville noted that "the first we knew about it was when we heard 'we want the Order of the O,' and that most of the football players (not necessarily including O club members) didn't know anything about it."

The excited freshmen, it appears, didn't wait for the "O" club—they figured the football team was good enough. So they charged the SU.

Board Innocent

Even though a Rally Board member drummed the whole thing up, apparently the Rally Board itself knew nothing about the planned riot.

Assistant secretary Nancy

Taylor and publicity chairman Bobbye Harris both said that the subject was never brought up at a Rally Board meeting. Other Rally Board members confirmed this.

Prall admitted that he had given the girls the idea to revolt. He remembered, he said, two years ago when University co-eds pulled a similar stunt. But only 200 were involved in the near-riot of two years ago.

The reason he suggested it was that "Everybody's been complaining about the spirit," he said.

"It did help the spirit," he added, "although a lot of people knew it was going to happen."

It all goes to show that one man can incite a riot—even though he doesn't mean to.
