

Melbourne Alive With Olympians As Games Near

MELBOURNE (AP) — The U.S. Olympic track and field team will make its Australian debut in a limited fashion Wednesday night at Geelong, a seaside resort 50 miles west of Melbourne.

Several nations will compete in the invitational meet but it is doubtful that Russia will.

Head Coach Jim Kelly said he will enter three men in the high jump, pole vault, shotput and high hurdles. Top sprinters in relay events and possibly some of the middle distance and longer range men will appear.

Kelly like others in the official party, is concerned about the extremely chilly weather here but also feels the athletes need competitive work.

MELBOURNE (AP) — Hungary's nationalists flag with the Kosuth shield was raised in a somber ceremony today without incident in front of the Hungarian headquarters at the Olympic Heidelberg village.

Around 60 red clad athletes with a Nationalist shield on their sweatshirts stood attention while the colors went up.

The other Hungarian athletes were either out on the practice field or wandering aimlessly around in the village.

Village commandant Philip Miskin conducted the ceremony together with Julius Heygi, Hungarian chief de mission.

MELBOURNE (AP) — The world's two greatest hammer throwers, America's Hal Connolly and Russia's Mikhail Krivonosov, who between them have broken the world record five times this year, met socially for the first time today.

Krivonosov's official mark of 211 feet and 1/2 inch has been well shattered by both men, with the American now well ahead with a recent toss of 224 feet, 10 1/2 inches.

Introduced at the Olympic village, Krivonosov asked Connolly how he had improved so much. The affable Boston strongboy attributed some of it to the use of weights to build up his strength. He also visited Europe at his own expense last summer to study methods there.

"Connolly is a very nice fellow, but I must beat him in the Games," said Krivonosov.

"It was nice meeting him, but I hope to win," said Connolly.

Pendleton Scores Win Over Albany

ALBANY, Nov. 12 (AP) — Pendleton eliminated Albany with a 25-6 decision here today in a class A-1 high school football quarter-final game.

For Pendleton, now with an 8-1-1 record, it was the first playoff victory in three consecutive years, of trying. Pendleton was ranked in a tie for sixth place in the latest AP poll. Albany was No. 9.

A hard-charging Pendleton line enabled the eastern Oregon players to get off to a 13-0 lead in the second quarter, and they never were in serious trouble after that. Halfback Don Barnes scored two touchdowns for Pendleton.

Albany's lone score was by halfback Gary Grill, who ran 27 yards and then 22 yards for the touchdown in a second-period drive.

Ducks Dominate Statistics; Crabtree Top Yard Gainer

Oregon's Webfoots continued to dominate team statistics over their opponents as figures released for the first eight games show.

The Ducks, though held to a 7-7 tie Saturday at the hands of Washington State, out-gained and out-rushed the Cougars. They also fumbled only once and recovered it for the best figure of the year in that department.

For the season Oregon has out-gained the total of their eight opponents in rushing, 1788 yards to 1270, in total yards gained, 2377 to 1922, and in first downs, 128 to 104.

Despite facing three of the nation's best passing teams this season in Stanford, California and Washington State, the Webfoots have only been out-gained in that department, 652 yards to 589.

Oregon, with wins over Colorado, Idaho and California, now has won three games, lost four and tied one. Despite the record they have outscored their combined opponents 112 to 87.

Individually, Tom Crabtree ran for 73 yards against WSC and passed for 93 to take over the team offensive leadership from Jack Morris.

Crabtree Takes Over

Crabtree has totaled 478 yards, 300 by passing and 178 by rushing. Morris has accounted for 469 yards, all via the running route. Crabtree's passing yardage leads the team, while Morris' rushing yardage is also tops.

Jim Shanley and Phil McHugh pace the Duck squad in pass receptions with eight apiece. Shanley also heads the team in scor-
