touched by the industrial revolution. Wright said the latter is protected behind a "barbed wire barricade of laws and customs," and dominates French politics.

Stresses Growing

Wright said although the stresses between static and dynamic France are growing, static France is being slowly eroded away. Production of industry is rising rapidly in France, he said, and the birthrate is "zooming." A "silent" or psychological revolution to overcome the static elements of France will probably occur, Wright said. He said the slow and gradual processes of change will take 20 to 30 years. Stable government will probably not come before the end of this period, he said.

France is closed to national unity on the Algerian issue than any other, Wright said. France

faces the problem of whether she can either afford to keep Algeria or afford to let Algeria go, he said.

'Smothered with Soldiers'

France is currently holding Algeria by "smothering her with soldiers," Wright told the group. Algeria is a special problem for France, for unlike Indo-China, Tunisia and others, Algeria has over one million Europeans living within her borders.

A question period followed Wright's speech. During this time said he believes the U.S. policy toward France has been good. We have followed a policy of education, he said, and have "nudged" France in the direction of change. "We should speak softly and carry a small twig" when dealing with France, he said.

Wright said he does not expect European unity in our lifetime. He agreed with ex-premier of France, Mendes-France, who said, "First we've got to reform at home. Then we can have alliances."

Robbers Caught; Money Recovered

Two men charged with the Monday afternoon robbery of the West Eugene Branch of the First National Bank of Portland were captured Tuesday afternoon. A total of \$2000 was stolen from the bank.

One of the men, Charles Edward Simmons, 40, a timber faller from Springfield, was arrested while enroute with his fiancée to Vancouver, Wash., to be married. Simmons, according to State Police Capt. Ray Howard, later confessed the crime.

Charged with driving Simmons car for the holdup was another man from the Eugene area, Don Howard, 23. Howard was arrested as he was on his way to Hope, Ore., to visit his father.

The bank robbery was the only local one in the memory of local law enforcement officers. Most of the money, which was in new \$20 bills, was recovered.

Pub Board Ok's Lit Magazine

Publication of a literary magazine was recommended by the Publications board at a meeting Tuesday night.

The magazine proposal will be forwarded to the Budget board, which has the power to advise President O. Meredith Wilson whether to accept or reject the idea.

The proposed magazine would be printed each term at an estimated annual deficit of \$2,500. It would not be a humor magazine.

"The main purpose of the magazine," according to the Publication board's written recommendation, "would be to reflect and intensify the best aspects of the intellectual life of the University of Oregon."

Articles for the magazine would be sought primarily from students and faculty of the University, as well as from outside sources.

Appointment of a student editor, business manager and managing editor, who would be advised by a committee of three faculty members, was recommended.

The Budget board, which will meet next week, will decide whether it believes the cost of such a publication should be financed by a fund resulting from student fees.

Northwest Quarterly was proposed as a tentative name for the magazine.
