

SU Board Holds Last Term Meet

The Student Union board in its final meeting of the term Wednesday agreed to the request made by the SU creative arts committee for the addition of a new phase in the committee's program, an art dessert.

Pat Shaffer, chairman of the committee, explained to the board that the dessert was to be an informal discussion period held monthly on aspects of all types of art. The discussion leader and speaker would not necessarily be professionally connected with the topic field but an authority on the subject as a hobby.

The board also approved the placement of the Friday evening coffee hour forum program under the supervision of the coffee hour committee instead of the creative arts group.

It was decided by the board to have the SU calendar of events for winter and spring terms printed as a small booklet in place of the large poster forms used this fall term.

Chairman Ed Fadeley announced that the next board meeting would be held Jan. 16.

present ROTC building. It is hoped that a new armory and auditorium will be constructed adjoining the new pool.

Wings will be built on the east and west sides of Johnson hall if present plans materialize. The east wing will necessitate removal of the Faculty club, and the west wing would cover part of Johnson hall's parking lot.

The research center will be constructed between the new physical plant warehouse and the Millrace. This site was chosen because of possible future extension to the east.

New Buildings Planned

Other structures proposed for a later date are as follows: a life science building, extensions to both Condon and Chapman halls, an additional men's dormitory with 1200 beds, a women's dormitory, an additional music building, a possible addition to the infirmary, an extension to the Student Union, possibly a new football stadium or at least enlargement of present facilities, an eight or ten story apartment

building to house married students and young faculty members and an addition to the library.

Little said that presently there are approximately two cars for every parking space. Present plans show no indication of alleviation for this problem. This year there are approximately 2100 student cars and 625 staff cars which use campus parking space.

There are 940 off-street parking spaces and 250 street parking spaces on the campus.

Little suggested that an eight or ten story garage erected over the Kincaid street parking lot would alleviate the parking situation. He pointed out that this also was his personal suggestion and not reflect the opinion of the committee.

The Campus Planning Committee is an advisory group appointed by the University president. The president decides what action will be taken on the written reports and recommendations submitted to him by the committee.

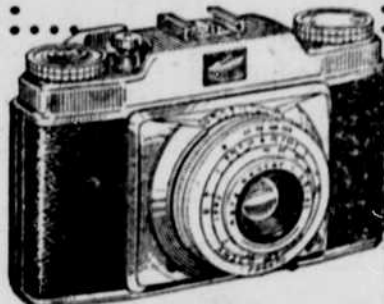
