



RE Week Discussion, Lecture Topics Given

Subtopics for the main lectures and panel discussions during the annual Religious Emphasis Week, Jan. 13-17, have been announced by Richard Johnson, general chairman of the week's activities.

Five speakers, representing different religious denominations, will each present a major speech on one of the topics which are keyed to the special interests, experiences and training of each lecturer. The speakers will also participate in panel discussions on all the topics.

Lecture by Hong Opens RE Week

General topic for the week is "The Place of Religion in Modern Life." Howard Hong, chairman of the department of philosophy at St. Olaf College, will open the week's activities with a lecture on "The Place of Religion in Business and Economics Today."

Other speakers and their topics include The Rev. Edward V. Stein, "The Place of Religion in Educa-

tion Today," Rabbi Joshua Stampfer, "Christianity and Judaism, Similarities and Differences," Gilbert A. Thiele, "The Place of Religion in Social Relations," and The Reverend Gerald Maguire, "The Place of Religion in Recreation and Entertainment Today."

Panel Discussions Planned

Two panel discussions with all speakers participating in addition to the regular lecture discussions, will be featured. "The Place of Religion in Government and Politics Today" will be discussed by the speakers on Jan. 16 and the week's activities will close with a panel on "Personal Religion in a World of Conflict."

One of the lectures, by Rabbi

Stampfer will be presented as a regular University assembly hour lecture. The usual coffee hour and discussion period will follow. Morning devotional services will be held by a number of denominations during the week. Firesides and other events at campus living organizations will also be held.

Car Accident Injures Profs

Two University of Oregon professors were injured in a head-on collision about 11 p.m. Friday on the icy Harrisburg bridge, north of Eugene.

David M. Dougherty, head of the foreign languages department, was listed as being in "satisfactory" condition and W. A. Leppmann, assistant professor of Germanic languages was listed in "good" condition by Sacred Heart officials Sunday.

William C. Butte, Salem, driver

of the other car, was also listed as "satisfactory."

According to the state police, Leppmann's station wagon, in which Dougherty was a passenger went out of control and crossed into the northbound lane to collide head-on with the car driven by Butte.

The accident occurred on Highway 99, on the icy south approach to the Harrisburg bridge, about five miles north of Junction City.

State police said both Leppmann's car and Butte's convertible were demolished.

All three men were rushed by ambulance to the Eugene Sacred Heart Hospital.

State police from the Eugene and Albany offices, the Lane county sheriff's office, and Harrisburg police investigated the accident.

New Rush Plan Now in Effect

The new Interfraternity council rush policy will begin winter term with open rushing. According to this policy, voted on last spring term by the group, only formal rush will be held fall term.

Open rushing will be held during the entire winter and spring terms, ending two weeks before finals.

Rushes may sign up for rush in Emerald hall 207 at any time, but must be registered for a total of five days before pledging is permitted.

A 2.00 cumulative GPA is required for open rush eligibility. For those who have not previously rushed, there is a \$5 rushing fee payable at the time of registration at the IFC office in Emerald hall.

If a rushee is pledged during the first two weeks of winter term, he may be eligible for initiation spring term. If he is pledged toward the middle or end of the term, he is ineligible for initiation until the fall term.

Assembly to Hear History Professor

"Two Viewpoints in Modern History," a talk by L. R. Sorenson, associate professor of history, will open the winter term assembly series. The talk is scheduled for 1 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom.

The impact of science and the scientific view on life in modern times and the reaction to and against this impact will be discussed by Sorenson.

Sorenson has taught at the University since 1947. Prior to that he gained his B.A. degree from the University of North Dakota in 1938. In 1945 he received his M.A. degree from the University of Illinois and in 1947 he earned his Ph.D. from the same school.

Currently, Sorenson teaches classes in western civilization and sophomore honors history.
