

Hoop Intramurals Scheduled Today

Winter term intramural action gets underway today, as three basketball games and one handball clash are scheduled.

Highlighting the basketball schedule is defending champion Phi Delta Theta's opener against Delta Tau Delta. The Phi Deltas captured the 1956 hoop crown when they ousted Morton hall in the finals.

The Phi Deltas currently are ranked second in the fall intramural standings which include football and class A and B volleyball. Game time will be at 3:50 on court 40.

At 4:45 on the same court 40, football champions, Alpha Tau Omega, will be trying for a basketball win when they face Phi Gamma Delta. ATO currently

ranks ninth in the standings with 212 points, while the Fijis are 13th with 199.

ATO won their league title last year but faltered in the tournament.

The third and final game of the day will pit Phi Kappa Psi against Sigma Phi Epsilon. Phi Psi gained the semi-finals in last year's tourney, while the Sig Eps placed second in their league.

Both the Sig Eps and the Phi Psi's placed second in the class A and B volleyball championships respectively fall term. The Sig Eps are third in the total with 264, while Phi Psi is eighth with a 216 point total.

All games are class A tilts.

Handball action will see Young hall meeting Kappa Sigma on courts 42, 44 and 46.

Tuesday's basketball play will pick up with six games on tap including IM leaders Hale Kane's opener. Kane leads in the point total with 300.

Basketball games this season will be played in five minute quarters, with two minutes between halves. Overtime periods will be three minutes with times out and between quarters, one minute. Each team must furnish a time and a scorekeeper.

Pros, Van Brocklin Bounce Collegians

HONOLULU, Jan. 6 (P) — A professional all-star squad led by five members of the Los Angeles Rams today defeated a college all-star team which included some of the year's greatest collegiate players, 52-21, before 24,000 fans at the 11th annual Hula Bowl football game.

The pros scored almost at will with Ram quarterback Norm Van Brocklin turning the game into a personal victory.

Van Brocklin passed for five touchdowns, completed 19 of 20 passes attempted for a total of 281 yards, and added four extra points on drop kicks.

Chieftains Win; Baylor Hits 41

PORTLAND, Jan. 6 (P) — Seattle university never led until the overtime period but defeated Portland 87-81 here today. Seattle's agile Elgin Baylor scored nearly half his team's points — 41.

At the end of regulation play the score was tied at 75-75. Then Seattle's Francis Saunders hit a jump shot and Jim Harney sank a layin to give Seattle an advantage which the Chieftains held for the rest of the period.

Dick Jolley, with 20 points in the opening half, was Portland's leading scorer with 24 for the game.

Baylor and Dick Stricklin led the late rally that tied the score. Three field goals by Baylor cut Portland's 73-65 lead to 73-71 with 3½ minutes left. Gene Kutsch then scored a goal for Portland.

Stricklin dropped in a pair of free throws and Saunders sank a field goal to tie the count.

Portland was ahead 45-34 at the half.

The victory gave Seattle a clean sweep of the series. The Chieftains won last night's game 81-68.

Webfoots Eye Bears In Coast Contest Friday at Berkeley

The Oregon Ducks play basketball for keeps from here on in. All pre-season doubleheaders and holiday tournaments behind them, the Webfoots of Steve Belko travel to Berkeley Thursday for a two-game series with the California Bears and the Oregon opening in the 1956-57 Pacific Coast conference season.

The Bear competition figures to be tops. Cal opened the PCC season with a pair of wins over Washington State at Pullman last weekend, using a full court

and Kansas, they have knocked off six straight teams including Arizona State, Arizona, College of the Pacific, San Jose State, and Washington State twice.

As evidence for their defense, College of Pacific could score only nine points in the first half against the Bears, eventually losing 76-34. San Jose could only muster 47 against Cal, the Bears rolling up 69.

The Ducks, however, do not have to stand on the sidelines as far as defense goes. Although losing five out of seven, only two teams have tallied more than 65 points against Oregon, and the seven game defensive average is 65 points per game, right on the nose.

Individually, the Bears are loaded with eight lettermen returning from a squad that finished in a tie for third in the PCC race last year. The Ducks, on the other hand, lost the nucleus of last year's squad, but have been crowd pleasers with a third of the season into the record books this year.

The Bears have Friend, Asplund, Don McIntosh, Ev McKeen, Joe Hagler, Earl Robinson, Bernie Simpson, Gabe Arrillaga and Mike Diaz back from a team which split a pair with Oregon last year in Mac court. Their tentative starting lineup will have Friend, McIntosh, Asplund, Robinson and Arrillaga on it, all five being potential scoring threats. In fact, many Webfoot rooters of last winter will remember the jumping Jack Robinson who single handedly beat the Webfoots in 1956, scoring 27 and 15 points in the two game series.

Belko's starters will probably remain a secret until the traveling squad is announced. Right now it looks like Charlie Franklin, Bill Moore, Hal Duffy, Wimp Hastings and Bud Kukendall have the inside track, but Dick Valentine, Eli Morgan and the injured Bingham have shown flashes of brilliance in the pre-season schedule.

Moore, eye healed and ready to go, poured in 15 points against

against Tulsa, as many as he had tallied in the first four tilts. Franklin hit his season's peak against Tulsa and Oklahoma City, scoring 20 points in each game, and with the scholastic battles off his shoulders for awhile, might carry the Oregon scoring load against Cal.

Duffy has been the most consistent of the Webfoots, offensively and defensively in the early season, scoring 60 points and improving considerably on defense. Sophomore Kuykendall hit his first varsity slump in the

press and the talents of two senior scorers to bottle up the Cougars. Center Duane Asplund scored 27 points in the duo affair, while his forward teammate Larry Friend notched 47.

Meanwhile, California sports writers have tabbed the Bears "the team to beat in the conference" so the Webfoots are sure to have their hands full come Friday and Saturday nights.

The Ducks get down to business preparations today in the first of three scheduled practice sessions. Belko returned yesterday from Pullman where he witnessed the Bear triumphs of 66-58 and 61-51.

The Ducks, sporting a 2-5 record after seven intersectional battles, may be without the services of vet forward Ed Bingham who bruised his heel in a Thursday practice scrimmage. Bingham, having the best year of his career was sidelined with the mishap and hasn't returned to the basketball wars of yet.

Otherwise the squad is in top shape for the Cal clashes which could shape up as a battle of defenses. The Bears with their full court press have given fits to ten opponents in starts this season, of which they have won eight. After dropping two of their first four, to San Francisco

final two games of the Southwest tour, being blanked in each game, but continues to fire away at a clip over 300. Hastings has been off and on the starting five this year, but when he teams with Kuykendall it gives the Ducks a one-two punch from the outside.

Belko was pleased with the Duck's first road trip and noted that they played good ball against Wichita, Tulsa and Oklahoma City. But that's all behind now. The chips are down for 16 conference games, and the still green Ducks, with an underdog tag on their shoulders, get shot number one Friday at Cal.
