Faculty Members Reported 'Good' After Accident

Faculty members D. M. Dougherty and W. A. Leppmann were listed in "good" condition Monday by Sacred Heart officials following a car accident involving the two men and William C. Butte of Salem.

Dougherty is head of the foreign languages department, and Leppmann is an assistant professor of German languages.

The head-on collision with Butte's car occurred on Highway 99, approximately five miles from Junction City on the icy Harrisburg bridge.

Condition 'good'

State police officials said Leppmann's car, in which Dougherty was a passenger, went out of control, crossing into the north-bound lane and crashing head-on into Butte's car. Butte's condition was also listed as "good."

Both Butte's convertible and Leppmann's station wagon were demolished, the state police said.

Following the accident, which happened about 11 p.m., all three men were taken by ambulance to the Eugene Sacred Heart hospital.

Dr. J. R. Degge is the attending physician for the men.

Brown Resigns As Yell King

Yell King Ron Brown has announced that he will resign from his position for financial reasons.

Brown, who was appointed by the ASUO Senate last Nov. 29 and had worked only one basketball game, told ASUO President Darrel Brittsan of his decision Monday. He will write a letter of resignation to the Senate within the next few days.

"I regret having to give up the job," Brown told the Emerald, "but a situation arose which I had not foreseen last term. I must work after school and on Saturdays to get through school."

Brown is the third of the original four members of the yell squad to leave his position. Phil Hill had previously resigned, and Clair Gimblin is ineligible for academic reasons.

This left Mike Smith, chosen yell duke after petitioning unsuccessfully for Yell King, alone on the squad.

ASUO President Brittsan has called for petitions to fill Brown's vacated position. The new king, who will serve through next year's football season, will be named by the Senate Jan. 17.

Moll Poems Featured In Browsing Room

A reading by E. G. Moll of his three latest poems will begin the winter term Browsing Room lecture series Wednesday evening at 7:30 in the Student Union.

In his lecture, Moll will focus upon the backgrounds of his poems. The first of these, "Dear Coleridge," has a literary theme; the second, "Rainbow Serpent," is taken from an Australian aboriginal theme; and the last, "Two Ships to Mitylene," is based on Greek history.

Widely Traveled

Moll, professor of English, has been at the University for 29 years. During that period, he has traveled widely, returning often to his native Australia, where the majority of his books of poetry have been published.

Christof Wegelin, assistant professor of English, will lead a discussion following the lecture.

East-West Theme

Also scheduled for this term are eight other lectures. The majority of these deal with Oriental subjects in keeping with the "East Meets West" theme of the approaching Festival of Arts.

The Jan. 16 lecture, to be given by Kohya P. M. Tagita of Nagoya, Japan's Catholic university, will be "Secret Christians of Japan."

Paul S. Dull will discuss "The Meeting of East and West: A Historian's View" on Jan. 23.

"Jade and its Place in Chinese Culture" will be the Jan. 30 offering. Mrs. Eric G. Clarke, collector and authority on jade, will be the speaker.

Literature, Architecture Topics

The first February lecture will be "The Philippines: A Nation in the Making" by J. V. Berreman. This talk will be given on Feb. 6. "Jack Ever the Twain Shall Meet: West and East in Chinese and Japanese Literature" will be the subject of D. S. Willis' Feb. 13 lecture.

On Feb. 20, M. D. Ross will trace the development of Middle-East architecture. "From Mud Brick to Mosaic Faience: Four Thousand Years of Architecture in the Middle East" is the title of his lecture. Colored slides will accompany it.

The anthropological slant will be evident in the Feb. 27 lecture. Theodore Stern will discuss "The Chins of Burma: A Hill Folk in Transition," and show slides de-

pecting the life of these primitive people.

"Prosperity in Peril: The Conflicts and Contradictions of the Economy of Malaya" will be the final lecture in this series. It will be given on March 6 by O. K. Kleinsorge.

Sorenson Speaks Today in the SU

L. R. Sorenson, associate professor of history, will discuss the impact of science and the scientific views of the world on life in modern times, and the reaction to and against that impact at 1 p.m. today in the Student Union hall. The topic of his speech, first of a series of winter term university assemblies, will be "Two Viewpoints in Modern History."

Sorenson, who teaches classes in western civilization and sophomore honors history, has been at the University since 1947. He received his B.A. degree from the University of North Dakota in 1938 and was awarded an M.A. degree in 1945. He received his Ph.D. degree in 1947, both from the University of Illinois.
