

Interior Secretary Asks Postponement

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (P) — Secretary of the Interior Seaton today asked Congress to postpone any sales of Klamath Indian timberland until it can consider whether all or part of the tribal forest should be bought and conserved by the government.

Under terms of the law ending federal supervision over the Oregon tribe, sale of the timberland could begin in a few months, Seaton said.

He specifically proposed postponement of the start of sales of Klamath timberland until after adjournment of the first session of the 85th Congress later this year.

He proposed additional changes in the 1954 Klamath Termination Act to spread any timber sales over a four-year period. He

said this would avoid depressing the market.

Seaton also asked Congress to provide that the federal government pay the cost of the termination program, up to \$1,100,000. The present law calls for the Indians to finance it.

The secretary pointed out the 1954 law now provides for federal trusteeship over the property and affairs of the Klamath Tribe and its members to be terminated by August, 1958.

It gives individual members the option of withdrawing their proportionate share of the tribal assets or of remaining in the tribe and sharing in the proceeds of continued forest management.

An appraisal of the tribal forest is now under way. Seaton said this is scheduled for completion in the next few months. Once it has been finished and approved by him, sales of the tribal forest to compensate withdrawing members might start under the present law.

SALEM (P)—Mark Hatfield, 34-year-old Salem educator, was sworn in Monday as Oregon's 26th secretary of state.

Probably the youngest man ever to hold the office, Hatfield was sworn in by Supreme Court Justice William M. McAllister.

The ceremony took place in Hatfield's office. He was host at a three-hour reception for the public immediately afterward.

Hatfield, a Republican, succeeds Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, who served nine years but couldn't run again because of a constitutional limitation to two terms.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton, a Democrat, also took the oath for his second term.

State Treasurer Sig Unander, a Republican who likewise began his second term Monday, had to take the oath two weeks ago because of a provision in his bond.

Fellowship Open To Graduate

The Brazilian university offers the award to a young man, preferably under 35, who wishes to study in any field at the University at Sao Paulo and in the Portuguese courses of the Uniao Cultural. The successful candidate is required to teach English a minimum of six hours a week and should have a good knowledge of Portuguese. Especially well-qualified candidates having a good knowledge of other Romance languages although unfamiliar with Portuguese may be considered.

Other requirements for the fellowship are: a Bachelor's degree from an American college or university of recognized standing by the date of departure; a demonstrated academic ability and capacity for independent study; good moral character, personality and adaptability; and good health.

NAPLES, Italy (P)—A shipload of Jewish men, women and children has arrived here from Egypt, telling a story of terrorism, imprisonment, expulsion, and the forfeiture of their property.

An officer of the Egyptian passenger ship Misr, which brought the 957 Jews from Alexandria, denied the account. He said the Jews were well treated and left of their own accord.

Hungarian Plan Sought by U.S.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (P)—The United States disclosed Monday it was consulting with other nations on a plan to establish a five-member U.N. committee to investigate the Hungarian situation.

The committee would be empowered to take testimony from Hungarian refugees on the intervention of Soviet troops and other phases of the Hungarian disorders.

A U.S. spokesman announced the plan shortly after U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold had recommended that the 80-nation General Assembly create such a special committee to study Hungarian developments. Informed quarters said the As-

sembly probably would be called later this week to take up the problem. By that time, U.S. sources said, a resolution will be in final shape and will be sponsored by 20 or more nations.

Previously, the General Assembly had given Hammarskjold the task of investigating the Hungarian situation. He had appointed special representatives to do this, but they had reported their inability to get sufficient reliable information.

Hammarskjold's recommendations were contained in a report to the 80-nation Assembly.

In view of the refusal of the Communist Hungarian government to permit the entry of U.N. investigators, Hammarskjold said, "the only course of new and direct information, under these circumstances, possibly available might be hearings with refugees from Hungary conducted, in the first place, in neighboring countries."

French Threaten UN Walkout

PARIS (P)—The U.N. Assembly was threatened Monday with a new French walkout if the Assembly decides to debate the nationalist rebellion in Algeria.

French Foreign Minister Christian Pineau warned his delegation would boycott any U.N. debate on Algeria as he took a plane for New York.

The French staged a temporary U.N. walkout after the Assembly agreed last year to debate Asian-African complaints against France's campaign to put down the rebels. The issue was allowed to subside without further debate and the French finally returned to the Assembly.

The Asian-African bloc has made its complaint to the Assembly again this session.

Neuberger Proposes Outdoor Facilities

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 (P)—A 10-year program to overcome the "long neglect of outdoor activity facilities" in the national forests was proposed today by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore).

He labeled his program "Mission 67"—a takeoff on the "Mission 66" program announced by the administration last year to develop the National Park System.

Neuberger was joined by Sens. Murray (D-Mont), Morse (D-Ore) and Clark (D-Pa.) in introducing a bill directing the secretary of agriculture to make a comprehensive one-year study of national forest recreation needs.

Mayor Schruk Plans New Curbs

PORTLAND, Jan. 7 (P)—Mayor Terry Schruk today said he will begin this week to formulate a plan—based upon parental responsibility—to curb juvenile delinquency here.

Schrunk has invited seven Portland civic leaders and officials to meet with him Wednesday to "formulate the framework for immediate and long-range solutions to the problem."

The seven are Juvenile Court judges Virgil Langry and Donald Long; School Superintendent J. W. Edwards; Catholic School Superintendent The Rev. Martin Thielen, Sheriff Francis Lambert, police Chief William Hilbruner and City Attorney Alexander Brown.

Agreement Signed By USSR, E Germany

BERLIN (P)—Leaders of East Germany and the Soviet Union in Moscow Monday signed an agreement setting up regulations for Russian troops stationed in East Germany, the East German radio announced.
