

Moll, Browsing Room Lecturer

Professor of English E. G. Moll kicked off the winter's Browsing Room lecture series last night by speaking on three of his recent poems.

The first of these, "Dear Coleridge," was a dramatic monologue of Dorothy Wordsworth. His purpose in this poem, Moll explained, was to show how Dorothy felt about Coleridge and to exhibit her feelings about her brother William's approaching marriage.

Before reading his second poem, "Rainbow Serpent," based on an Australian aboriginal legend, Moll traced the legend of the god, who having created passion and fleshly joys in the world of his making, is unable to taste them himself and so is driven to madness.

His final explanatory remarks, on the poem, "Two Ships to Mitylene," noted that it deals with a historical event of the Peloponnesian War era. This event, a ship's journey carrying a death verdict reversal for 10,000 Mitylenians with the executioners vessel having a 24-hour start on them, is based primarily, Moll said on the record of the Greek historian, Thucydides.

A short lyric, "Summer Evening," closed the lecture, which was followed by a short discussion period. This section of the program was led by Christof Wegelin, who also introduced the speaker.

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Professor Gains Committee Spot

Paul Washke, professor of physical education and health has been named to participate in a committee to help plan the role of the American Assn. for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in the National Education Association's centennial action program.

Ray O. Duncan, president of the association, made the appointment.

Mora Refugees Set to Arrive

PORTLAND (AP)—Twenty-three Hungarian refugees—most of them young unmarried men—are scheduled to arrive here tomorrow morning aboard a United Airlines plane.

The refugees will remain here until sponsors arrive to take them to new homes all over Oregon, according to Mike Shard of the Oregon Committee for Hungarian Refugees. A list of their destinations is being prepared.

The group will raise the number of Hungarian refugees who have arrived in Portland to 145. Officials said those who arrived earlier all have housing and all but 20 have permanent jobs.

Lodging Space On Sale Today

Lodging reservations for the Inter-collegiate Winter Carnival to be held Jan. 26-27, go on sale today according to Dick Wood, University representative.

Wood said there would be room for only 110 University students to attend because of crowded facilities, and he urged all those desiring to attend to get their reservations early. Reservations will be on sale until 4 p.m. in the Co-op.

Buses will run from Portland to the site of the Carnival, Timberline, because of the shortage of housing. Shuttle buses from Zig-Zag to Timberline are also scheduled to run all day and late at night.

Ski Quacks to Meet At Student Union

Racing tryouts will be held Jan. 19 and 20, Laughton said.

The first meeting of Ski Quacks will be held tonight in the Student Union. Items to be discussed are the Winter Carnival and the racing events.

Four motels, the Zig-Zag Motel in Rhododendron, Mt. Air Motel at Brightwood, Bradley's Motel near Rhododendron and Snow Bunny Lodge two miles east of Govt. Camp, are available for housing. Further information about housing for the event may be obtained at the Co-op booth.

Tickets for the Carnival will go on sale sometime after the weekend of Jan. 18, Wood said. Cost of the ticket is \$4, and entitles the holder to two days of skiing, admittance to all races, the bonfire, use of Timberline Lodge, the fashion show, dances, the tug of war, and other carnival events.
