

Duck Quintet Leaves For Cal Games Today

Oregon's upset-minded Ducks depart for the Southland by airplane this afternoon to engage in a two-game basketball series with Pete Newell's hotshot California Bears.

California, preseason pick for the PCC crown, is currently leading the league with a 3-0 mark and is heavily favored in the coming series.

But Webfoot mentor Steve Belko, hopeful of an upset, had his boys fired up in a lengthy practice Wednesday.

The Ducks first unit, consisting of Charlie Franklin, Hal Duffy, Wimp Hastings, Bud Kuykendall, with Bill Moore trading off with Eli Morgan, continued to work against a California-type full court press thrown up by the second unit of Richie Costi, John Lundell, Paul Tucharadt, Henry Ronquillo, and Phil McHugh.

McHugh, who just joined the team, looked especially sharp in the drill, and is certain to see action in Berkeley at either a guard or forward post.

Ed Bingham, sharp-shooting forward, ran for a short time on his injured foot, which will keep him from making the trip for the California tilts.

The Bears, loaded with eight lettermen led by Earl Robinson, Duane Asplund, and Larry Frieid were warned not to take the fast-breaking Webfoots lightly in their practice session by Coach Newell. Newell said he expected plenty of trouble from the green-shirted invaders from the North.

Although the Bears have a potent offense, the biggest worry for Oregon seems to be the stiff Cal defense. Sometimes using a full-court press, and at others using a tight zone, California always makes it tough for the other team to score. A good example of this occurred in the Cal-COP game in which College of Pacific scored a total of nine points in the first half.

Belko refused to name a starting lineup but did name the 12-man traveling squad, which will consist of Duffy, Kuykendall, Ronquillo, Franklin, Hastings, Morgan, Lundell, Costi, Moore, Tucharadt, McHugh, and Dick Valentine.

Cal Seeks Daugherty

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Michigan State's Hugh (Duffy) Daugherty heads the list of possible successors to Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf as football coach at the University of California, the San Francisco Examiner said Tuesday.

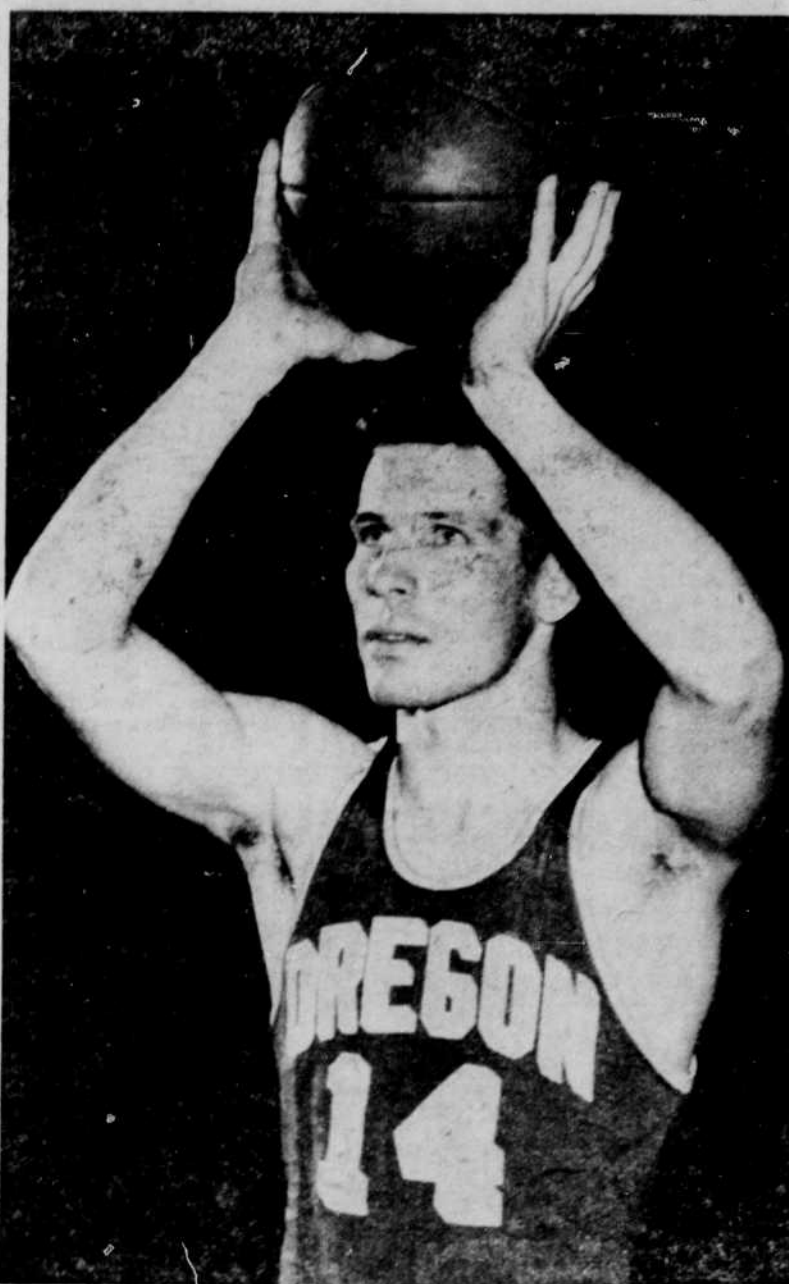
The Examiner's Don Selby said in a front page story that the list of candidates for the California job has been narrowed to three, with one preferred.

He said that close observers at Berkeley were almost unanimous in the opinion that Daugherty is the man.

Without naming his sources, Selby said that California is prepared to go as high as \$20,000 to obtain its choice.

Waldorf was receiving \$17,500 when he resigned after ten years at the UC helm.

Selby said negotiations for California's new head coach are being conducted by executive director Paul Hastings and athletic director Greg Engelhard at the American Coaches association meeting in St. Louis, Mo.

Wrestlers Work Out For PSC Encounter

Oregon's potentially powerful varsity wrestling team, and the undermanned Frosh grappling squad are undergoing intensive practice sessions under the eye of coach Bill Hammer, in preparation for their opening matches against Portland State college and Eugene High school.

The varsity takes on the always dangerous Portland State squad next Wednesday, the 16th, while the Frosh, still looking for team members, will tangle with the Axemen on this Saturday.

Coach Bill Hammer says that not much information has been received about the Portland State team, but from past records, they will provide more than enough competition for the Duck matmen.

Last year, only a last minute victory by heavyweight J.C. Wheeler pulled the fat out of the fire in the match, and that was just to gain a 16-16 tie. Other years have proved to be about the same, with the big-city squad always coming up with good men. (Lee Allen formerly attended PSC and was a coast champ while enrolled there).

Hammer's comment on the Duck squad was "We've only had four or five days to work out in since the Christmas holidays, and of course we're a little rusty. The fellows are working real hard, however, and in another month we'll be a hundred per cent better. I don't feel that this will be one of our better matches, though."

The lineup for the varsity squad so far lists a strong squad of experienced men in most

weights, but Hammer stressed that a number of changes were both possible and probable because of the strong competition for many of the positions.

In the 123 class is Bob Stevens, who hasn't had much experience, but is coming along very fast, followed by U.S. Olympic champ Lee Allen in the 130 pound class. At 137, a tight battle is ensuing between Ken Karnes and J. D. Griffith, both experienced men.

Former PCC champ Dave Newland, who is already in good condition, presently has a hammerlock on the 147 bracket, while former state champ Jim Beaton, who is a sophomore, and Junior Howard Timmons, a regular last year, fight it out for the 157 honors.

The next three weights are held down very solidly by three men who placed in last year's PCC tournament, coast champ George Krupicka, at 167, runner-up Ken Kesey at 177, and third place winner J. C. Wheeler at heavyweight.

The frosh lineup for the Eugene high match tentatively is Cary Parks at 123, Maurice Coe at 130, Bob Fox, 137, John Parker, 147, Kim Brewster, 157, Larry Eines, 167, Earl Henderson, 177, and John Willener at heavyweight.

Hammer again asked for more freshmen, regardless of experience, to come out for the Frosh squad. The freshmen have a busy schedule, with a match at Klamath Falls on Monday and another meet on Wednesday night, and more men will be needed to give depth for the tight schedule.

3 IM Teams Win Basketball Tests

McClure hall, Stafford hall and Philadelphia house experienced little or no trouble in notching victories in class A basketball action Wednesday.

Stafford had the hardest game, but finally overcame a slow start to topple Young hall, 34-22.

Hungarian Miler Denies Statement Of Dissatisfaction

NEW YORK (AP) — Laszlo Tabori, Hungarian mile runner, and his coach, Mihaly Igloi, flatly denied statements attributed to them in Miami Wednesday. They were reported to have expressed strong dissatisfaction with their accommodations, food and training facilities.

But following an afternoon flight to Newark and a car ride here, both coach and runner, speaking through interpreter Alex Brody, said the statements "were not made."

The Hungarians, members of a group of Olympic athletes who refused to return to their native land because of Russian oppression, were brought to this country under the sponsorship of Sports Illustrated magazine. They are now under the wing of the AAU which has arranged for Tabori to run in a series of nine indoor meets.

Tabori said Wednesday he will definitely run in the first of these meets at Boston Jan. 19, provided he is able to train under the proper conditions.

The "proper conditions" are to be discussed with AAU secretary, Dan Ferris, as soon as they can get together. Ferris was supposed to meet with the Hungarians Wednesday, but he has been ill and was not able to attend the press conference.

Tabori and Igloi said their hotel room and meals in Miami were excellent and that the track facilities at the University of Miami were perfect. Their only difficulty, they said, was transportation to the training area, a distance of approximately six miles from their quarters.

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
