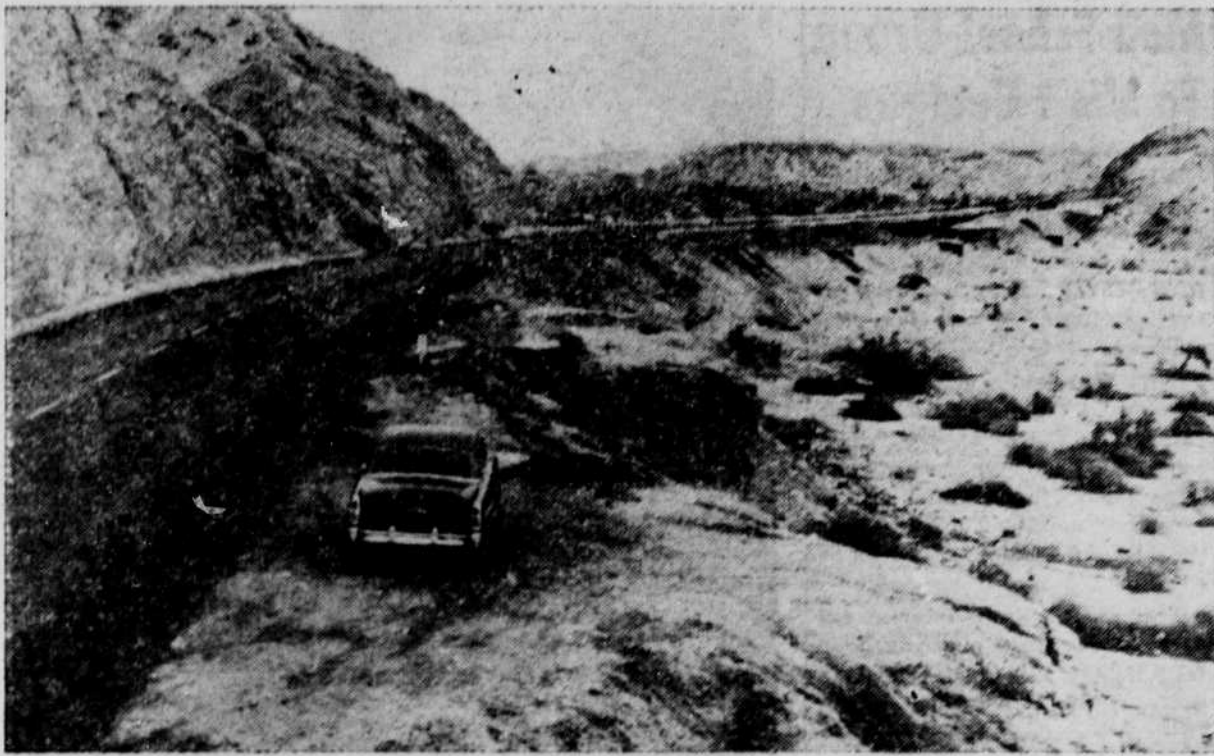

IRVING POTASH, U.S. Communist Party official who voluntarily underwent deportation to his native Poland in 1955 after serving prison term for conspiring to teach or advocate violent overthrow of the U.S. government, is handcuffed in New York Jan. 5 as he arrives at federal court for arraignment of charge of illegal entry into the United States. Arrested Jan. 4 in a Bronxville N.Y., restaurant by FBI men, he was held in lieu of \$35,000 bail.
