

R.E. to Highlight Worship Services

The University Religious Council's long-planned Religious Evaluation Week gets underway Sunday and will continue through Thursday with a full schedule of events.

Of major importance will be the main addresses given by each speaker. Each of the talks will relate to the theme "Religion in Modern Life," except for that of the Jewish representative who preferred to speak on his own faith.



One of the most over-looked but also the most valuable activities of RE Week is the morning worship service. This year the brief services will be held at 7:15 each morning Monday through Thursday in the Men's Lounge of Gerlinger hall.
