

Fashion Fellowships Offered Senior Women

Fashion Fellowships are being offered by the Tobe-Coburn School for Fashion Careers in New York City to senior women. All senior women graduating before August 31, 1957 are eligible to apply for the fellowships offered for the year 1957-1958.

The number of fellowships will not exceed four and each one will cover the full tuition of \$1150. The fellowships are offered to encourage college graduates to enter the fashion field. Graduates of the school hold jobs in buying, advertising, styling, as well as in magazine editorial work.

In the course of one year, students come in contact with the fashion industry and participate in fashion shows and fashion exhibits. In addition, they have ten weeks of working experience in New York stores and other fashion organizations.

Senior women may secure Fashion Fellowship registration blanks from the vocational office,

or from the Fashion Fellowship Secretary Tobe-Coburn School for Fashion Careers, 851 Madison Avenue, New York, New York. Registration closes Jan. 31, 1957.
