

Dorms, Fraternities Nab IM Wins

Four dormitory squads and two fraternities took victories in intramural B basketball play Tuesday.

Sheldon Hall topped Philadelphia House 28-24, French Hall bounced Alpha Hall 26-20, Morton downed Stafford 29-15 and Young smashed Cherney 26-11 in dorm action, and Chi Psi whipped Sigma Alpha Mu 32-21 and Sigma Nu tripped Lambda Chi Alpha 25-16 among the fraternities.

SHELDON WINS

Intramural basketball fans were treated to their second overtime game of the young season when Sheldon Hall's B entry opened their campaign on the right foot by nipping Philadelphia House, 28-24.

The winning effort by Sheldon was an all-around one, with all but two of the ten men listed on the roster breaking into the scoring column. Center Don Richey was highest up on the totem pole with eight, and it was the last of his four field goals that clinched the victory.

After the Phillies had come from behind in the waning moments of the fourth quarter to tie things up at 24 apiece, the lanky, bespectacled Richey did his bit on a hook shot that arched perfectly through the basket without touching the rim.

With less than 30 seconds remaining, the Philadelphia quintet went into a full court press in a desperate attempt to gain possession of the ball. Immediately, Larry Granquist was fouled and proceeded to the charity line where he dropped in the two points that fed the Sheldon win.

Carl Mark, the losers' little forward and sparkplug, nailed down scoring honors for the nip-and-tuck contest with twelve points.
