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Magazine Holding Contest for New Writers

Mademoiselle's 1957 College Fiction Contest, now under way, offers college writers an opportunity to get into print. Although the contest is designed for under-graduate women, men as well as women may submit their stories throughout the year to be considered at the magazines regular rates.

Two contest winners will receive \$500 each for serial rights to their stories and publication in "Mademoiselle" magazine. The runners-up will receive honorable mention and the magazine reserves the right to buy their work at regular rates also.

Winners and honorable-mentions will be announced in the August 1957 College issue.

Rules for the contest are as follows:

- Any woman undergraduate under 26. Regularly enrolled in an accredited college or junior college may enter.
- Stories that have appeared in undergraduate publications are acceptable if they have not been published elsewhere.
- Stories must be original and characters fictitious.
- Stories should run from 2,500 to 5,000 words. More than one story may be entered.
- Regulation-size typing paper should be used. Entries must be typewritten, double-spaced, on one side of the page only. Work must be marked clearly with name, age, home address, school address and school year. A 9" by 12" Manila envelope, self-addressed and stamped, should be enclosed, or stories received will not be returned. Mademoiselle assumes no responsibility for manuscripts.
- Mademoiselle editors will

judge the entries, and their decisions will be final.

- Entries must be postmarked by midnight, March 15, 1957, to College Fiction Contest, Mademoiselle, 575 Madison Avenue, New York 22, New York.
