

'Rockers' Seen As Fight Cause

CLEVELAND (AP)—Police Lt. Ray Moran blamed it on the youths being, as he put it, "hopped up on this rock 'n' roll trash."

Manager Jack Silverthorne of the Hippodrome Theater in downtown Cleveland said rock 'n' roll had nothing to do with it. "We could have been playing 'The Robe' or 'The Ten Commandment' and if an element was looking for a fight it would find it," he said.

Whatever the cause, sporadic fighting at the theater last night sent 14 teen-agers to hospitals with cuts, scratches and bruises and ended with the theater being closed for the night shortly after 9 p.m.

Hundreds of teen-agers were tossed out of the Hippodrome before Lt. Moran ordered a halt for the night to the showing of "The Girl Can't Help It," featuring musical talent of the rock 'n' roll variety.

No arrests were made.

Silverthorne said it appeared to be "groups against groups."

Anthony Agresta, 16, a Mayfield Heights High School football player, heard someone say, "Okay, boys, let's get 'em." Then, said Agresta, "I saw one of them jump down from the balcony. He must have come down 15 feet."

Agresta said his overcoat was taken off and torn and his sports coat and shirt were torn. He said he went home in a bloody T-shirt.

AEC Reports Test Of Soviet Weapon

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Russians have exploded at least their fifth test explosion of nuclear weapons since last August. The actual total may be higher.

The latest Soviet test, made Saturday, was announced by the Atomic Energy Commission Monday.

In its customary terse fashion, the AEC said "the Soviets yesterday conducted another nuclear weapons test in their current series which has been resumed since the announcement by the Soviets was made by the United States on Nov. 17, 1956."

An AEC spokesman said there would be no further details.

The commission's statement was the 17th U.S. announcement of a Soviet nuclear test over the years but AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss said actual number of Soviet tests has been significantly higher than the number announced by this government.

It is stated AEC policy to make such announcements only when the Russian tests are deemed to be of special interest "because of their size, their special character or some other unusual fact."

There was no indication of what special interest was attached to the test announced yesterday.

Previous Soviet tests in the current series, as announced by the U.S. government, were held on Aug. 24, Aug 30 and Sept. 3.

U.N. Attempts to Stop Israeli Troop Deadline

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—Y.U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold is working against a Thursday deadline to get all Israeli troops back inside their country.

Few if any observers expected him to succeed in getting the Sinai invaders out of the two stretches of sandy wasteland—formerly held by Egypt—by the deadline imposed by the General Assembly.

Israel has agreed to pull out by tomorrow from all the territory it seized from Egypt except in two areas, which the United States and Britain have suggested that U.N. forces occupy. But the Israelis do not believe the U.N. troops could give sufficient protection against Egypt's using the Gaza Strip as a base for organized fedayeen commando raids into Israel.

Egypt has rejected the idea of either area being occupied by anyone by Egyptians.

MONTE CARLO (AP)—Monaco's eight Roman Catholic churches and shipping tycoon Aristotle Onassis' yacht maintained a round-the-clock alert today, ready to welcome the arrival of their first baby to Princess Grace and Prince Rainier.

The infant who someday may reign over the principality is expected any time now. When it arrives, the public will get the word this way:

A motorcycle messenger, also now on duty at all times, will speed to the port's saluting battery and the cannon will blast, 101 times for a boy, 21 for a girl.

As soon as the cannon is silent, Monaco's 14 church bells will peal. The Anglican Church of St. Paul's won't join in—it has no bell.

The bells are in danger of being drowned out by the siren on Onassis' palatial yacht.

Alcorn Said Choice For GOP Chairman

WASHINGTON (AP)—A high administration official predicted today President Eisenhower will tip the scales for H. Meade Alcorn Jr. of Connecticut as new Republican national chairman.

If he wishes, Eisenhower can virtually dictate the choice of a chairman. If he does not, a bitter fight could break out for the post being vacated Feb. 1 by Leonard W. Hall.

An eight-member group headed by Harry Darby, Kansas national committeeman, will call on Eisenhower tomorrow to get his ideas about a new chairman.

Hall named the Darby group at

a meeting of the party's national committee here Saturday. The committee will meet in open session tomorrow to get Darby's report on the conversations with Eisenhower before electing a new chairman.

Alcorn, who directed arrangements for last year's national convention, was one of half-a-dozen men Hall said had been mentioned as possible successors.

If Alcorn is chosen, he is expected to pledge active cooperation with Republican members of Congress for a drive to overturn Democratic control of both houses in next year's election.
