A rule forcing the rebounder to dribble before he shoots or to pass it off, as Belko would advocate, would certainly do away with many of the points that are gathered each night by the giants. But with defense as important as it is now, possession has become nine-tenths of basketball as well as the law.

You can't have possession without rebounds, and you can't have rebounds without tall men. So it looks to us that there's only one way to legislate the big man out of basketball—do away with the backboard, and thus rebounds entirely, making it strictly one shot every time down the court. If anyone has a more sensible plan for eliminating the "Stilts" and "Swedes," we'd welcome his suggestion, and will pass it along to those in authority.

We refuse to consider the plan submitted by one wag around the sports department. He'd LOWER the baskets, instead of raising them as suggested by some coaches, perhaps making them vertical instead of horizontal, just to make it a little harder to score. In the remaining two contests, both Class B matches, Kappa Sigma rolled to an easy win over Chi Psi and Campbell Club downed the Legal Eagles.

Kappa Sigs Win

In the afternoon's curtain raiser, Kappa Sigma led all the way to smother Chi Psi, 26-10, and register their second win in as many outings this season.

The game was actually more of a lopsided affair than the score indicates. The losers showed no real sign of life until the fourth quarter when they notched eight of their ten point total. And by that time it was obviously too late.
