

Cykler Gives Music Speech

Dr. Edmund A. Cykler speaking on the "Pleasures of Music" at yesterday's 1 p.m. assembly was aided in his presentation by the University Brass Choir under the direction of Ira Lee which played two compositions by John H. Hendrickson, member of the band.

Cykler also shared the spotlight with the University Singers who were led by Max Risinger in singing "All Creatures of our God and King," "O Lovely May" and "Radiant Stars."

In opening his speech, Cykler reported that although "a response to music is universal, of all the arts it is the most difficult to discuss." Therefore he enlisted these groups to help him strengthen the point that the pleasure of music comes to the creator, the performer and the listener.

According to Cykler, the fundamental responses of music are rhythm, melody and tone quality. The rhythm contributes sensuous pleasure to musical numbers, the melody is the first musical significance added to rhythm and the tonal quality is that part of music which can not be eliminated in any great work.

The fourth attribute of music as we understand it is texture, either in harmony built of chords or in contrapuntal quality of two or more melody lines. The rhythm, tone quality, melody, and texture were cited by Cykler as the "inherent pleasures of music."

"A listener," said Cykler, "must also feel the part of the creator and the performer. He must not merely hear without listening."

Play Lead Panny Describes Inside Story of Active Life

As thrilling as his performance in "The October in Spite of Himself" is the life of Vincenz Panny. Coming to the University Theatre last year Panny is at last realizing his long desired ambition to act.

Of German nationality Vincenz was born in 1918 in China and attended school in Germany. During the war he spent four and a half years as a prisoner of war in Egypt. There he used

his free time to develop his acting ability.

Upon release from prison camp he returned to Germany with the hope of turning his acting hobby into a career. However, Germany in 1948 did not offer employment in the theatre.

Very restless, Vincenz went to Australia where he became a primary grade school teacher. While in Australia he was able to participate in two amateur acting groups, Port Lincoln and Pencola.

A brother and sister-in-law who lived in Eugene instigated Vincenz's journey to America. Vincenz is now attending the University on a foreign student scholarship and plans to teach drama, speech, French and German in high school after graduation in two years.

His family still lives in West Germany. He is unmarried and when asked if there were any prospects he replied, "Oh, I saw a beautiful one walking across the campus today."

Slight Decrease In Enrollment

A drop of 1 per cent of total enrollment occurred between fall and winter terms according to figures released from the Business office.

Registration figures show that 3288 men and 1832 women are currently enrolled for winter term in comparison to 3477 men and 1929 women for fall term. A total of 5,120 enrolled as contrasted to 5736 for the beginning of year. Last year's total was 4,695.

Of this number, 145 students entered Oregon for the first time, 139 returned from previous terms, and 4836 continued on from fall term.

Enrollment drop was sharpest in the freshman class, which decreased from the original number of 1564 to 1318.

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Three Jet Bombers Break World Record

WASHINGTON (AP) — If jet tanker planes had been available, three B52 bombers could have clipped about six hours from the time it took them to circle the globe last week.

That is the estimate of Lt. Col. James H. Morris of San Antonio, Tex., who piloted one of the three heavy jet aircraft more than 24,000 miles in 45 hours and 19 minutes.

Morris told newsmen the bombers could have "kept right on going" if that had been necessary. He voiced the opinion that the B52's range, when refueled in flight, is limited only by the physical endurance of the men who fly it.

During their round-the-world journey, the B52s were refueled at intervals by KC97 tanker planes which are driven by conventional non-jet engines.
