

Smith Views Suez Wednesday at SU

The perspective that last century's history can bring to the Suez crisis will be discussed by R. W. Smith, assistant professor of history, at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Student Union.

Sponsored by Beta Theta chapter of Pi Sigma Alpha, national political science honorary, the talk will be open to the public.

This is the first in a series of three discussions on the Suez crisis. Meetings during February will feature M. D. Wattles, associate professor of economics, speaking on the crisis from the economist's viewpoint, and C. P. Schleicher giving the political scientist's viewpoint.

Persons attending each meeting have been invited to come at noon and bring sack or tray lunches.

Bureau Reports Value On Tax Levies Higher

EUGENE, Jan. 27--The Bureau of Municipal Research at the University of Oregon reported today that the combined value of all tax levies in cities of Oregon is \$90,051,721.

That is 11.8 per cent higher than the levies for last year.

The assessed valuation of taxable property within cities this year total \$1,126,877,235. This is 54 per cent of the state total of \$2,020,796,537.
