Duck Tracks

Charlie Franklin's assault on the Duck record book against Washington State this weekend might be a "coming of age" for the Webfoot star, who hadn't reached such a scoring peak since he donned a green and gold uniform 35 games ago.

The 6'3" junior forward who made the trip to Eugene from sunny Los Angeles found the cold weather at Cougarville to his liking, something of a switch from his days at LA junior college.

Franklin Shatters Six Records

From the record book, Franklin fractured six standing Duck records, one that had existed since 1951 and the days of Bob Peterson. The records in order of importance are:

1. Total points by a Webfoot - Franklin, 36. Old record held by Jim Loscutt who tallied 35 against Brigham Young in 1955.
2. Total points in a PCC contest - Franklin, 36 besting by four, the former record of 32 set by Barney Holland against the same Cougars in 1954.
3. Free throws made - Franklin, 18. Old mark set by Max Anderson in 1954 against Johnny O'Brien and Seattle U. Anderson made 13 out of 17.
4. Free throws made in PCC play - Franklin 18. This was Bob Peterson's old mark in '51 when he canned 14 against the Washington Huskies.
5. Free throw attempts - Franklin 21. Charlie upped the old record by one. Anderson, again in 1953, shot 20 free throws against UCLA.
6. Free throw attempts in conference play - Franklin 21. Chet Noe set this mark in 1953 when he attempted 17 against WSC.

So Charlie's six records, we can see, knocked a host of former Webfoot greats off the white pages of the record book, as far as individual scoring goes. But the springy-legged Franklin has a long ways to go before he can erase the season records and rebounding records established by Dick Wilkins in 1945 and Loscutt in '55. Wilkins scored 544 points the year the Ducks tied for the Northern Division crown and represented the PCC in the NCAA playoffs and Loscutt grabbed off 32 rebounds against BYU, the same night he scored 35 points.

PCC: A Three Team Battle

Comment on the current Coast Conference: It looks like a three-team battle to the wire for the title, with the other six teams scrambling for the also ran spots. Cal, UCLA and Washington, at the half-way point, are far ahead in what looked like a dog-fight after the first round battles. The Bears and Bruins, still unbeaten in PCC action, have 5-0 and 4-0 records respectively while the Huskies have lost once in eight starts.

Charlie Franklin's 56 point spurt against WSC has placed him far above the pack in the Duck scoring race. Franklin has tallied 182 points for a 14 point per game average, 49 more than runner-up Hal Duffy who has 133.

Duck Grapplers Pound Cougars

The Oregon Webfoot wrestling team won their third consecutive dual meet of the season and their 16th consecutive dual meet over the last two seasons as they downed the Washington State College Cougars 33-6 in Bohler Gym at Pullman.

Winning all but two matches, the Ducks were helped by forfeits in three of the weight classes, the 123, 157 and heavyweight divisions.

This victory, following in the wake of OSC's win over the Cougars by a 29-6 count points to a busy week ahead for the Oregon grapplers in preparation for their meet with the OSC varsity next Saturday.

On comparative scores, the Ducks have a little better of the matches, but this doesn't mean too much, as by comparative scores, the Oregon football team this year should have taken Oklahoma by about two touchdowns.

The Ducks downed Portland State by a 20-6 count, while SC only got a 15-11 victory, and the Webfoots came out four points ahead in the WSC matches, 33-6 as to OSC's 29-6. Needless to say, next weekend will be one of the big ones for Bill Hammer's muscular charges.

The only two losers in the WSC encounters were J. D. Griffith, in the 137 class, and Howard Timmons in the 167 bracket. Both lost by identical scores, a close 2-0.

Winners by pins for Oregon

were Dave Newland at 147, Ken Kesey at 177, and J.C. Wheeler at 191. All three of these men placed in the top three in the coast tournament last year, and are undefeated so far this year.

Oregon also picked up three forfeits in three weight divisions to round out their score at 30. The other three points was added by U.S. Olympic member Lee Allen in 130 pound class, who had to extend himself to beat tough Cash Stone of WSC, 13-7.

The Ducks returned yesterday by car from Pullman, where minus temperatures have been prevalent, and will begin preparation for the OSC match today. The Frosh are working for their match this Wednesday with Roseburg.
