

Huskies Host Ducks In Non-PCC Clash

Chief threat against Washington

Only three days since their last game, Oregon's busy hoops meet the University of Washington in a non-conference battle at Seattle tonight at 8:00 p.m.

The Webfoots, after two close losses to Washington State this past weekend, will be out to upset the Huskies who have lost only one PCC game this year. Washington defeated Oregon State twice over the weekend.

Oregon guard Bud Kuykendall, who sprained his ankle in Friday's WSC tilt, flew back to Eugene Monday, but is expected to see action Friday against the Stanford Indians.

The rest of the team, though possible cold from the sub-zero temperatures up north, should be in good shape for the game.

Husky coach Tippy Dye will rely on his two high scoring stars center Bruno Boin and forward Doug Smart to carry the offensive load for the team.

Boin, an all-coast selection last year as a sophomore, is noted for his accurate hook shot and currently is averaging 18 points per game in PCC play.

Smart is one of the top sophomores in the west with his excellent rebounding and high scoring. He already has eclipsed the Husky scoring record for sophomores with 33 points in his game against Kansas. In PCC play, Smart hit for an 18.6 average in eight games.

The Huskies are one of the leading scoring units on the coast and currently lead the Conference in field goal accuracy.

The Ducks, though buried in the cellar at present, looked especially sharp offensively against the Cougars hitting for 81 and 67 points in the two games.

Charlie Franklin will be the chief threat following his record breaking performance against Washington State. With 56 points added to his PCC total, the high-scoring Oregon forward now is

averaging 18 points in the six PCC games played.

Among those that should see action in tonight's game are Franklin, Eli Morgan, and Bill Moore at forwards, Hal Duffy at center, and Wimp Hastings and Phil McHugh at guards.

Last year in their traditional "extra" game, the Ducks edged Washington 53-51 at McArthur court, but lost their two conference games to the Huskies at Seattle, 68-50, and 70-61.

These two clubs will meet again Feb. 15-16 in regular PCC games at Mac Court.

This weekend the Webfoots will resume their Conference schedule with two home games against the PCC "spoilers," Stanford.

The Indians, while not burning up the PCC with their 2-4 record, nevertheless have their two victories over Oregon State and Washington, and should provide plenty of fire works for the Ducks Friday and Saturday nights.

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Frosh Wrestlers Open Home Slate

The Oregon Frosh wrestling squad will have their first home contest Wednesday night at 7:30 in Mac Court when they take on the powerful Roseburg High School wrestling squad.

Roseburg has been a power in the Willamette Valley area for several years and has always sent a strong contingent to the state wrestling tournament.

According to Coach Bill Hammer, they have a "representative squad," which means that they are fairly strong at all weights.

The Frosh, so far without a win in three starts, have been practicing diligently against the varsity for the last two weeks, and should be able to give the Roseburg squad a run for their money.

Tentative Frosh lineup for the match will have Gary Parks at 123, Maurice Comeau at 130, Bob Eastwood, a new man at 137, Kim Brewster at 147, John Parker at 157, Allen Smith-167, Larry Hines-177, John Willener-191, and Earl Henderson at heavy-weight.

The varsity has been working hard this week after their 33-6 victory over Washington State and are now pointing for a victory over the University of Washington this weekend.

This is the first year Washington has had an intercollegiate wrestling squad and are not expected to be exceptionally strong. The odds should be evened somewhat by a match Saturday morning with Seattle Pacific College, which will precede the Washington encounter.

The Seattle Pacific match came as a last minute arrangement when the Seattle school found out that the Webfoot mat squad would be in the area.

The school has had wrestling teams previously, but not too much information has leaked out concerning them. The Seattle Pacific match will be at 9:30 Saturday morning and will be followed by the Washington bout at 2:00.

The varsity will have no time to rest after their busy weekend, however, since they will have to be preparing for their match with OSC on the following weekend.

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Duckling Quint To Face Rooks

Undefeated thus far this season after six starts, Oregon's freshman basketball squad will play host to Oregon State's Rooks, Friday and Clark JC, Saturday.

The Duckling-Rook clash will be the first of four meetings between the two clubs. The Frosh defeated Clark 71-61 earlier this year at Vancouver, Wash.

The Rooks, who are still seeking their first victory of the season, will face Clark Wednesday before moving to Eugene Friday. So far, OSC's frosh have lost to Clark, Lower Columbia JC and the University of Portland junior varsity.

The Rooks boast a 6-7 center in Joe Mann from Irrigon, Oregon. Ray Lundie, 6-2 forward, is expected to be one of the top scorers for the Rooks. He scored 14 points in their last outing against the University of Portland's JV's.
