

FOUR DEAD

More Than 1000 Idle Due to Cold Streak

Shortage of electric power idled more than 1,000 men in light metals plants and at least 2,000 more were thrown out of work in other industries as bitterly cold weather hung on in the Pacific Northwest.

The deaths of at least four persons have been attributed to the cold weather and numerous house fires were reported.

Kaiser Aluminum reported the biggest layoff of plants hit by power shortages with a total of 550 at Spokane and Tacoma plants. Aluminum Co. of America and Reynolds Metals Co. laid off 470 more men in four northwest plants.

At Newport, on the Oregon coast, two separate bed fires caused two deaths Monday.

Mattress Burns

Mrs. Eleanor Anderson died while attempting to put out a smoldering mattress fire in her cottage.

Charles Bradeson, 75, a patient at a nursing home, died in the other bed fire.

Another death attributed indirectly to the cold wave was reported Monday. Aretucs Clark Estey, 84, died when fire swept through his small home at Sauvie Island near here. A defective heater was blamed for the blaze.

Sunday Harry F. Gelvin, 73, Portland, was overcome by carbon monoxide fumes while cleaning his car, with the engine running, inside a closed garage.

Columbia Frozen

The Columbia River was frozen solid from bank to bank upstream from The Dalles.

The contractor building The Dalles Dam laid off about 500 men because of the cold. Closure of other industries in the region idled 250 more.

At Albany plywood mills were shutting down Monday because the logs were too brittle to turn on the lathe. Stacked green veneer sheets have frozen at some plants, causing some production troubles.

The cold had made some 1,000 men temporarily jobless in the Albany area.

The petitions must be returned to the SU box next to the Program Director's office on the third floor of the SU.

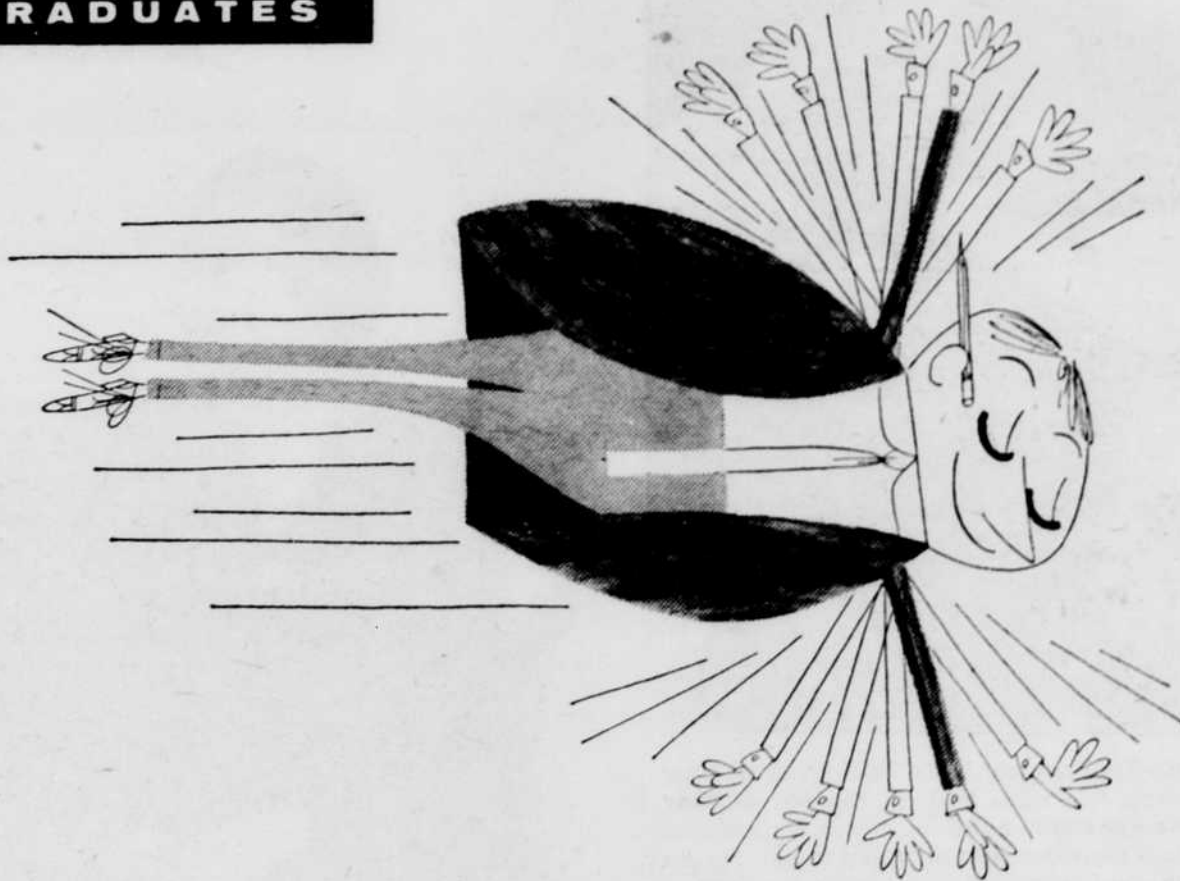
Quartet Contest Registration Due
