

Army Officer Posts Open to Law Grads

A program open to law majors to fill 200 officer vacancies in the Judge Advocate General Reserve Corps for the fiscal year 1957-1958 has been announced by the corps through the University Army ROTC department. Direct appointments for three year duty will be made to fill the vacancies in existence.

Requirements for a commission are: the candidate must be a graduate from an accredited law school; he must be in the upper two-thirds of his law school class; he must have been admitted to practice and have membership in good standing of the bar of the highest court of the state or federal court; and he must be presently engaged in the practice of law, teaching law, or holding judicial office.

Those interested should contact either the ROTC department or the senior army adviser of the U.S. Army Reserve in Eugene.

UT Play Closes Saturday Night

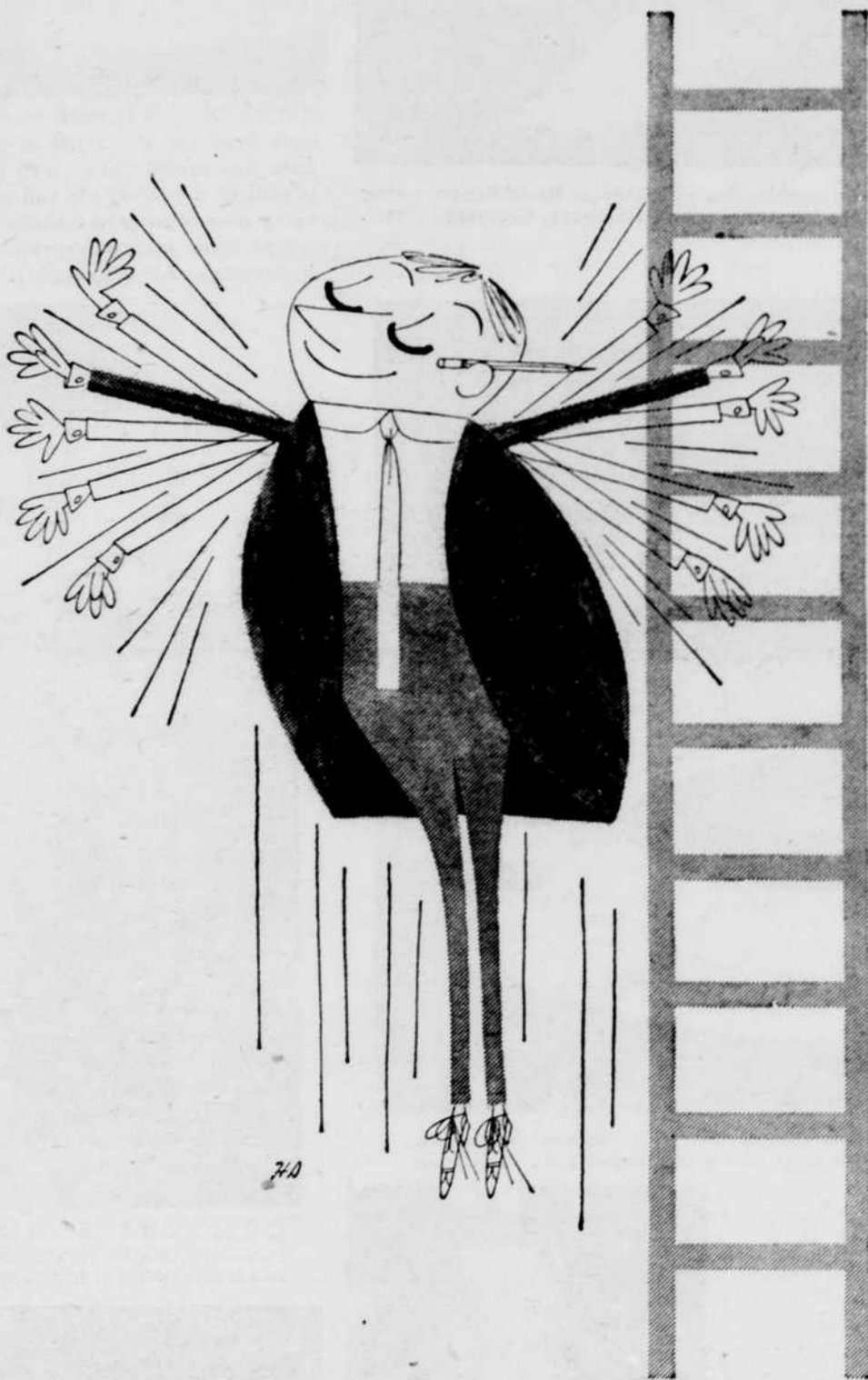
