

Smith Talks on Suez At Honorary Meeting

The first chapter in the decline of the British and French to coerce Egypt, was accompanied by an increase in Egyptian nationalism, he said.

Smith suggested that the answer to canal control would be to internationalize it, vesting control in the United Nations. He added that "this idea may be too radical."

Smith's speech was the first in a series of three talks on the Suez crisis sponsored by the honorary. All are open to the public.

M. D. Wattles, associate professor of economics, will discuss the problem from the economist's viewpoint on Feb. 13 in the Student Union. The crisis from the political scientists' viewpoint will be given by C. P. Schleicher, professor of political science, on Feb. 27, also in the SU.

Schmidt will retain an interest in the company, but control will rest with Carl O. Fisher, Eugene, and two sisters, Jane Fisher, Portland, and Mrs. Nancy Harrison, Salem.

Fisher, president of Salem Broadcasting Co., is president and general manager of radio station KUGN, Eugene.

Way for approval of the transfer was cleared by the FCC's denial of a protest from W. Gordon Allen, KGAY, Salem, Allen contended earlier ownership details in the station had not been made a matter of record with the FCC, as required by its rules.

Jury Room to Get Soundproofing Job

PORTLAND (AP)—The grand jury room in the Multnomah County Courthouse is being soundproofed. Workmen got at the job Wednesday.

Last summer, because of fear that testimony in the probe into Portland vice charges might be overheard, the grand jury met in the State Office Building.

The validity of the indictments have been attacked on the ground the grand jury must meet in the courthouse. There has been no court ruling on that argument.

The soundproofing includes covering walls and ceiling with acoustical tile and the plugging of certain air vents.

Large Recruit Group Off for WAC Camp

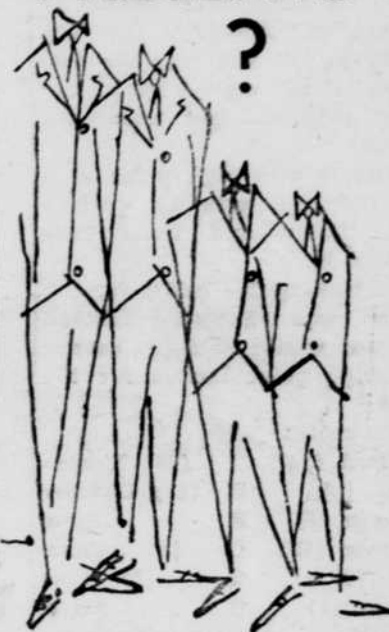
