Mademoiselle Selects Six From University

NEW YORK, N.Y.—University of Oregon will be represented this year on Mademoiselle's national College Board by Jo Anne Rogers, senior in music; Marcia Mauney, senior in journalism; Lisa Hart, senior in art and architecture; Barbara Bryan, junior in political science; Cornelia Fogle, junior in journalism; and Suzanne Jette, sophomore in liberal arts. They are among the 650 students who competed with applicants from colleges all over the country to win places on the Board, according to Mademoiselle magazine.

As College Board members, they will represent their campuses and report to Mademoiselle on college life and the college scene. Each girl will complete two assignments that will help her explore her interests and abilities in writing, editing, fashion, advertising or art, in competition for the twenty Guest Editorships to be awarded by the magazine at the end of May.

The guest editors will be brought to New York for four weeks next June to help write, edit and illustrate Mademoiselle's 1957 August College issue. Their transportation will be paid to and from New York and they will receive a regular salary for their work.

In addition to their work on the magazine, Guest Editors will interview outstanding men and women in their chosen fields to help clarify their career aims, will visit fashion showrooms, publishing houses and advertising agencies and will be Mademoiselle's guests in a round of party and theatre-going.
