There can be no question of consent to the Inter-institutional Dormitory Policy Committee Rule since it is admitted by the administration that this rule was not communicated to the Suzy girls.

And that Rule does not cover this case, as I see it, anyway. Thus it provides no shield for those who claim to assess a confiscation of breakage fees upon the basis of it.

The Rule appears to cover a case of damage to a dormitory caused by the students living in that dormitory, which damage can't be traced to any specific inmate or inmates. There is no ground in reason, wisdom, necessity or justice to interpret it otherwise.

News Pictures Are on Display

The traveling exhibit of the 13th annual "News Pictures of the Year" competition, co-sponsored by the National Press Photographers Association and Encyclopedia Britannica, will be on display at the University library until Feb. 15.

This exhibit will feature all of the top prize winners and finalists in this year's contest—the largest of its kind in the world today. It will also include representative prints from the top portfolio that gave the title, "Magazine photographer of the year" to Grey Villet of Life.

The news pictures of the year competition has become one of the most important in press-photography competitions because it represents NPPA's educational program, including short courses in photo-journalism at educational institutions, according to library authorities.

The still division of this year's contest was judged in ten different categories, plus four categories in the newsreel division. This exhibit contains a cross-section of prints numbering about 125 from all ten categories in the still contest. This year's show tours 75 cities throughout the country, being exhibited in leading colleges, universities, public libraries and museums.

A dinner in honor of Hodding Carter, the 1957 University of Oregon Eric W. Allen Memorial Lecturer, will be given Feb. 14 by the four journalism and advertising professional honoraries.

All students in journalism are invited to the dinner. Carter, publisher of the Greenville Mississippi Delta Democrat-Times and former Pulitzer prize winner and Nieman Fellow, will deliver the main address at the annual Oregon Press Conference, to be held on the University campus Feb. 15 and 16.
