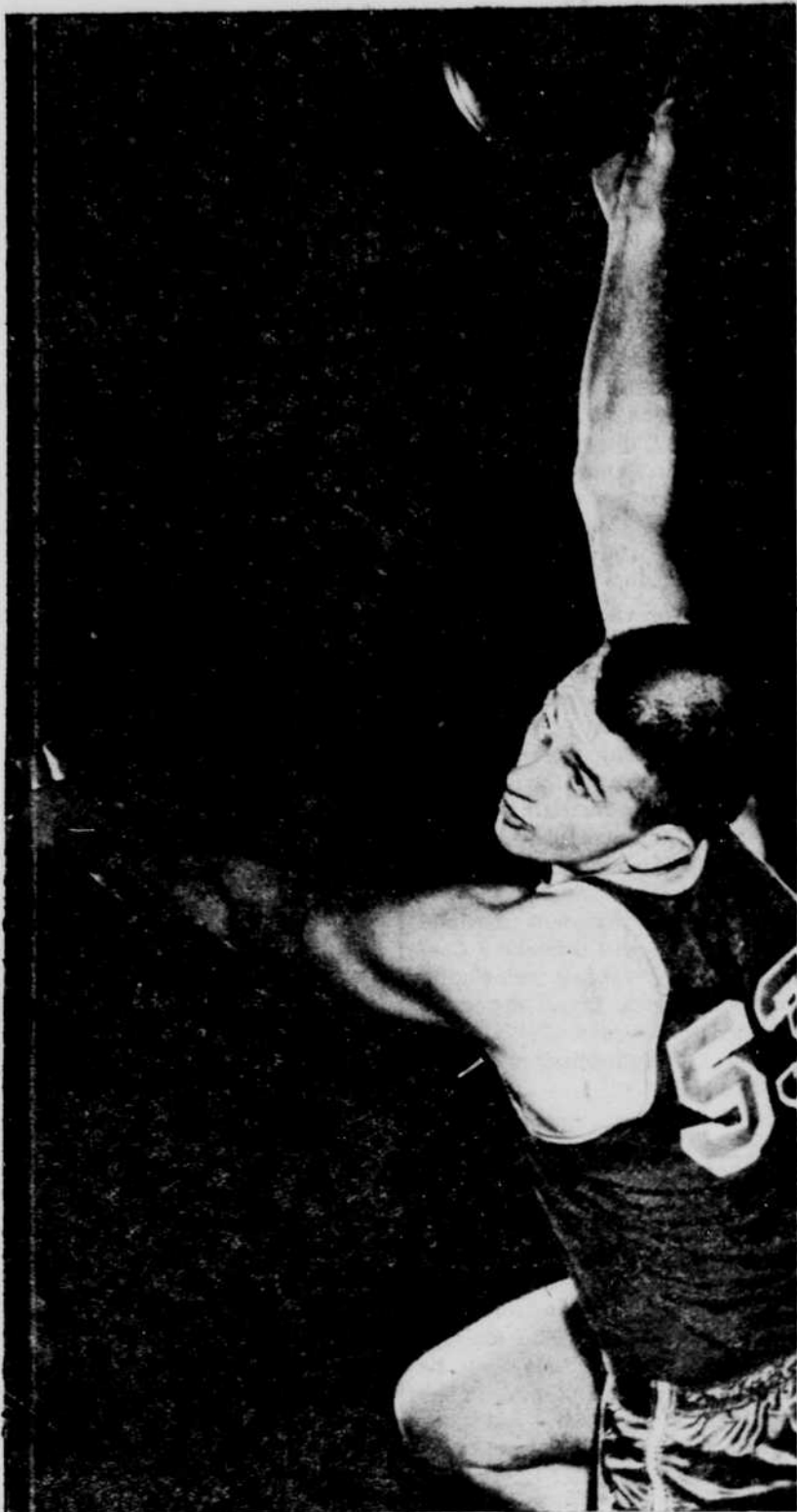

Two Ducks Push PCC Pace-setters

Oregon's basketball fortunes as a team were down this week, but a pair of talented juniors are pushing toward the top in the PCC individual statistics, giving notice of better days to come.

Forward Charlie Franklin is fifth and Center Hal Duffy ninth in scoring averages, while Duffy is second and Franklin sixth in rebounding, according to statistics released today by the PCC Commissioner's office.

Franklin has scored 149 points in eight games for an 18.6 average; Duffy has 104 points for a 13-points-per-game mark. In rebounding, big Hal is second only to Washington's Doug Smart. Smart has 119 rebounds and a .177 average, and Duffy has grabbed off 112 for a .174 percentage of total chances. Franklin has 81 rebounds and a .125 mark to his credit.

But the potent offensive combination of Washington State's Larry Beck and Washington's Doug Smart continued their domination of the conference statistics.

Beck leads in scoring and Smart in field goal percentage and rebounding. Beck has averaged 22.9 points per game in his first eight outings with 57 field goals and 69 free throws for 183 total points.

Smart has scored on 58 of 109 field goal attempts for 53.2 per cent with Dick Haga, Stanford, in close pursuit at 50.8 per cent. Smart has a rebounding mark of .177 on 119 recoveries in 675 total opportunities.

The Ducks are above the half-way mark in only one team sta-

tistical department. They stand fourth in rebounding, having copped 335 to 328 for their opponents.

UCLA, currently riding a record-equalling winning streak of 22 consecutive Conference games, leads the pack in three departments. The Bruins lead in total scoring, free throw percentage and field goal defense; are second in total defense and rebounding and sixth in field goal percentage.

Next action for Oregon is a non-conference game with Oregon State at Corvallis next Tuesday. Then the Ducks take on Washington in a home series that weekend.

Hale Kane, French Cagers Annex 'B' League Crowns

The usual late-season forfeit binge continued to plague intramural basketball action Tuesday, but Hale Kane and French Hall didn't let the abbreviated schedule bother them as they both sewed up berths in the Class B championship playoffs which open next week.

Hale Kane annexed the League V crown while French wrapped up the League VII title. Both clubs went through the season undefeated and had previously qualified their Class A entries.

None of the three forfeit rulings—Campbell Club over Tau Kappa Epsilon, Philadelphia House over Alpha or Cherney over Morton—really had any bearing on the various pennant races.

Sigma Chi gained the quarter-finals of the intramural handball tournament by handing Theta Chi a 3-0 loss Tuesday.

Stafford Wins

Stafford moved into a tie for first place in League VI by defeating Young 20-18 in a fast-moving, low-scoring class B game.

It was the first loss for Young and forced a playoff game between the two teams next week. The winner will then be undisputed league champions and will enter the final IM elimination tourney.

The two clubs were almost evenly matched with the lead changing hands several times during the game. Young took a narrow halftime lead, 9-8, but the Staffordites charged back after intermission to take control.

Frequent substitutions by the Stafford team seemed to affect the Young five and once behind in the final stanza, they could not catch up. Only a last-second basket by Young narrowed the margin to two points.
