Duck Tracks

With the 1956-57 school year half over, men's living organizations are stepping up the pace in their bids for the all-sport intramural championship. Football and volleyball were completed during fall term; basketball, bowling and handball are on the current winter term program; while softball, track, golf and tennis remain to be played.

Looking back over the action during the past term and a half, several IM games stand out as tops for thrills. In football, it was a mighty Alpha Tau Omega team which rolled to the championships undefeated and unscored upon. The ATO's were held to a scoreless tie by Beta Theta Pi midway in the season, but that was their only blot as they went on to defeat Phi Delta Theta in the finals 7-0. Among ATO's five victories was a record 51-0 over Delta Tau Delta.

Top individual performance of the season was by Dick Anderson when he led his Phi Gamma Delta eleven to a 49-0 triumph over Phi Kappa Sigma. Anderson figured in every one of the Fiji's seven touchdowns, passing for six and running for one.

Hale Kane Rules Volleyball

Later in the term volleyball took over the intramural spotlight and leading the way was Hale Kane which won the class A championship and gained a league championship in class B competition. Led by Dudley Makahanaloa, the Kane six rolled through seven games without a defeat, topping Sigma Phi Epsilon 15-4, 15-12 in the finals.

In the class B finals, Theta Chi defeated Phi Kappa Psi 15-9, 15-13 for their first championship of the year. Among the top matches of the season was their close triumph over Phi Delta Theta's defending champions, 15-8, 15-17, 9-7. It was a touch-and-go affair all the way and was the closest thing to a loss for the class B champions.

By the end of the term, Hale Kane held a slight six point lead over Phi Delta Theta. The Kane football and volleyball teams racked up a total of 300 points, while the Phi Deltas totaled 294. Sigma Phi Epsilon (264), Theta Chi (250) and Cherney Hall (242) ranked behind the leaders.

Hoop Tournament Looms

Basketball thus far this term has added even more thrills to the intramural program. New league champions are now being decided every day with the hoop tournament coming up next week. Highest scores run up thus far in the season are Delta Upsilon's 53 points against Lambda Chi, and McClure's 53 against Young. The DU's Lee Shelton scored 23 points in the same Lambda Chi game for season's high scoring honors.

Delta Tau Delta currently boasts the best record in any of the four intramural bowling leagues with 11 wins and one loss. Phi Kappa Psi's Mike Zimmerman boasts the season's high series with a 225-191-201-617. No winners in handball have been determined, but quarterfinal action begins today with only eight of the 31 entering teams remaining in contention.

Spring term will find intramural athletics moving again to the great outdoors. With a close race developing for first place in the over-all standings, it looks like the four spring sports will determine the winner. Last year's champions include Sigma Chi, softball, Phi Delta Theta, track, Dorm Counselors, tennis, and Alpha Tau Omega, golf.

Last year Phi Delta Theta won the intramural championship with 959 points. Hale Kane was second with 866. Thus far this year it looks like the two teams will be battling again for the title, as both teams have been strong in basketball play after both teams completed a successful fall term.

Regardless who wins, the intramural program will seem worthwhile to the participating students whether their team places first or 100th.

Trotters to Play Riders in Monday Mac Court Action

The Harlem Globetrotters, the magicians of basketball who have entertained fans in every corner of the world, will appear for local fans in McArthur Court Monday night. The show, beginning with two outstanding vaudeville acts, starts at 8 p.m.

The Trotters, sometimes called America's basketball ambassadors, will play the Hawaiian Surf-Riders, another barnstorming team. Prior to the game and at halftime, a six act vaudeville

troupe will entertain the fans. Special student tickets are being sold at 60 cents. These are general admission for the regular student seating sections.

When Coach Abe Saperstein's troupe started this, their 30th season, they owned one of the most fantastic winning totals in basketball. Playing sometimes five times a week against any team that was willing to take them on, the Trotters have compiled a total of 5,395 wins against 303 losses.

For more than ten years the Trotters have been adding vaudeville acts to their show and currently have one of their best. Included in the troupe which appear at McArthur court are a unicyclist, a juggler, an accordionist, a three man balancing act and a Japanese bicycle artist.

Last season the Trotters won 344 of 354 games. All ten of their losses were to the American College All Stars, whom they edged in their annual series 11-10. Regular season play throughout the United States saw them win all 172 of their games.
