2. Pictures must be "Jumbo" size, (standard print size), or larger and each picture or picture series must have the contestant's name written on the back.
3. Pictures cannot be returned except by special permission.
4. Judging will be based on aptness of subject material, interest, clarity, and picture composition.
5. Decision of the judges is final.

What about the effect of a fifteen-hour-per-week job on extra-curricular activities? Esther seems to feel that "the more you have to do, the more you get

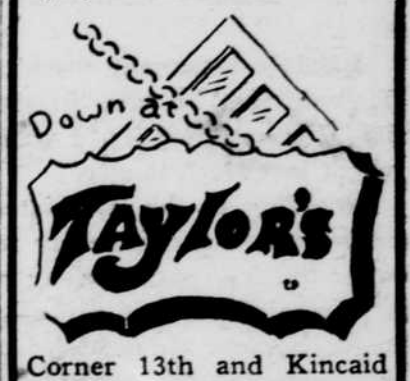
done," and she has planned her job around her duties as Rebec House president and president of Co-Ed Housing.

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Display Features Near-East Relics

Cuneiform tablets, letters written on papyrus, and money coined during the era of King Herod, are only a few of the many ancient objects currently on display at Chapman Hall.

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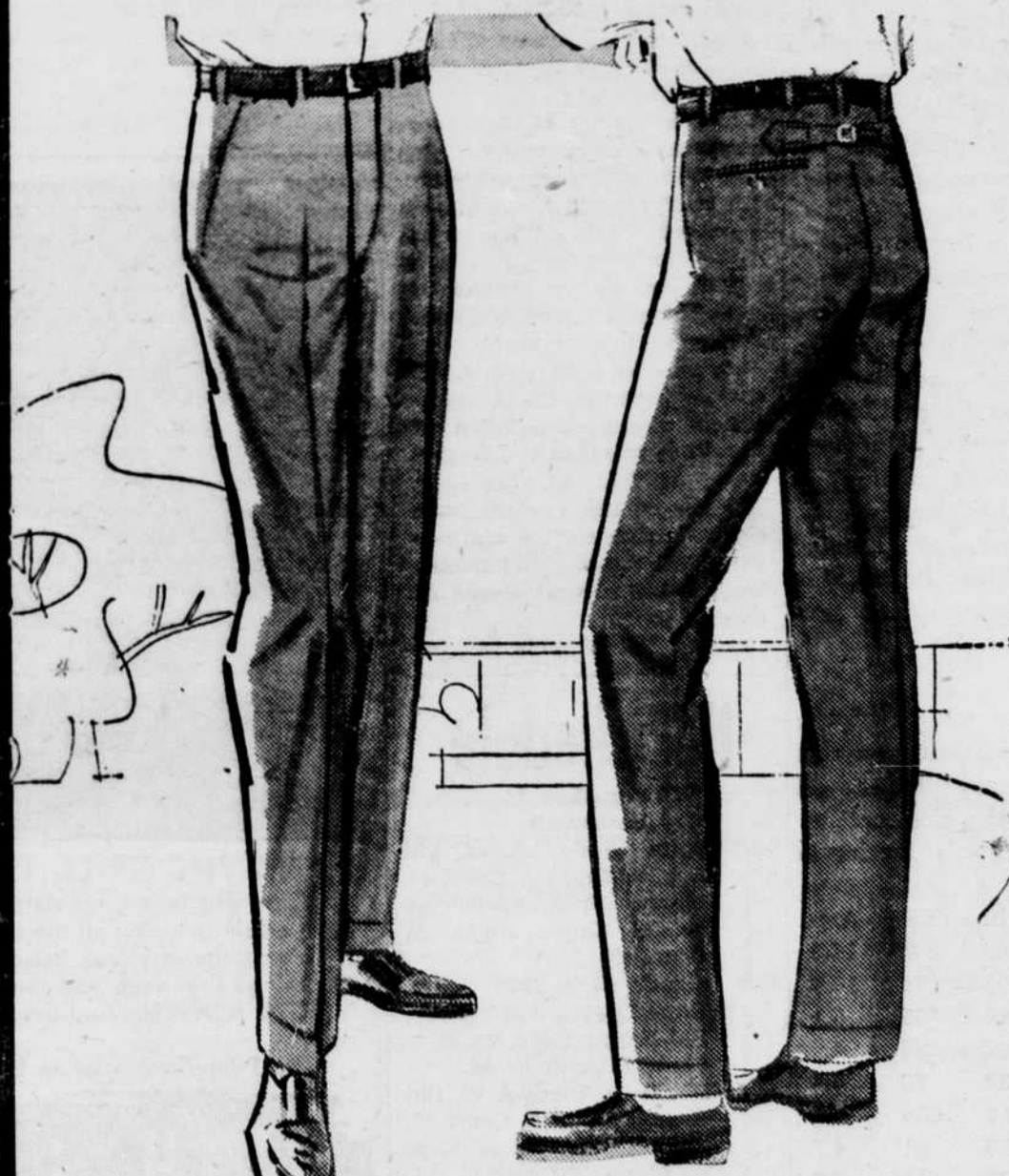
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
