

Webfoots Rest; Sigma Chi, McClure OSC Scheduled Snag IM A Triumphs

With 16 rugged games behind them, Oregon's Ducks take a well-earned siesta from PCC struggles this weekend.

The locals, coached by Steve Belko, are currently crouched low in the conference cellar; they've won but one counting tilt while dropping seven, but the rest may push them on to greater, more successful activities. At any rate, the "rest" isn't quite as leisurely as it sounds: Belko plans to drill his troops today, Saturday and possibly Sunday, in preparation for Oregon's initial contact with OSC there Tuesday night.

In Thursday's session, the Webfoots divided into two camps in order to enjoy some intra-squad competition. Nominally, this game pitted the "Oregon Seniors" against the "Oregon Sophomores," but in reality the sophomores could boast of only three players in that category. But the competition was there, and apparently very fierce.

Thus, Oregon's Seniors roared from behind in the game's final moments to score a 61-55 triumph over the Sophomores. Rangy hook-shot artist Paul Turchardt and Ed "Si" Bingham paced the Seniors' victorious uprising.

They led at the half by a 30-26 score, but eight straight points by Charlie Franklin, Eli Morgan and Dick Valentine overcame this bulge with astonishing swiftness. The sophomores then remained in front until Bingham and his tall mate started hitting. "Si" had four field goals in the last period.

The game was ultimately de-

cided at the free throw line: the Seniors had 19 for 31, while the Sophs got but 11 chances and scored on seven, although they led in field goals 24-21.

Oregon's top point-producer, Charlie Franklin, led as usual; he dropped in 20 markers for the Sophs. Turchardt scored 16, Phil McHugh had 14 and Bingham scored 13 for the Seniors.

As mentioned before, the Ducks will travel up Benton County way on Tuesday to encounter Slat's Gill, Oregon State and Dave Gambee. This game won't count in Pacific Coast standings, but it's all-important for prestige and in the post-season crowd-eating competition between Belko and Gill.

Trojans Tap Clark For Coach Duties

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Don Rex Clark tonight inherited the job of head football coach at the University of Southern California, an assignment some big name coaches rejected because the Trojans have been crippled by Pacific Coast Conference eligibility bans.

Clark, 33, is a former Southern California guard, and has been line coach for Jess Hill at USC for the last six years. He was a guard for the San Francisco '49ers for two years, then started his coaching career under Eddie Erdelatz at the U. S. Naval Academy. He mapped the Navy defenses that upset Army in 1950.

Clark's duties with USC have been to instruct the guards and map defense patterns. This will be his first job as head coach, and he will take over a squad considerably depleted from that which finished the 1956 season with a 6-2 record.

The search for a successor to Hill, who steps up to the post of Athletic Director with the retirement next summer of Willis O. Hunter, has been under way for a year, and a screening committee reportedly contacted Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma, Duffy Daugherty of Michigan State and Bowden Wyatt of Tennessee.

There was a slim schedule for the intramural program Thursday, with only three games on the schedule and one of these was cancelled. Sigma Chi and McClure each pocketed easy final victories, while the Flizz-Eds forfeited to Chi Psi.

Sigma Chi blasted Tau Kappa Epsilon 31-14 in a game where the shooting ran from red hot to ice cold in the space of a few seconds. McClure had an equally easy time in their last league games, dumping Sheldon 32-13.

Both games were in illustration of the old adage, "rebounds should win bellgames." The victors completely controlled those all important boards on both ends.
