

Essays on Freedom Due March 8 for U.S. Drive

Essays in conjunction with the campus Crusade for Freedom will be due on March 8, according to Laurie Fisher, essay chairman.

The essays are to be from 250-500 words long, and should deal with the general subject of "My Personal Views of Student Freedom on the Campus." All essays must be turned into Miss Fischer at Alpha Chi Omega on or before March 8 in order to be eligible for the awards.

Awards will be given for the top two essays in the group, and will consist of merchandise certificates donated by local merchants.

The essays must be double spaced on regular 8 1/2 by 11 paper, and must have the student's name and class typed on the bottom of the last page.

The judges are faculty members from the English department. Their decision will be final, Miss Fischer said.

Miss Fischer especially emphasized the necessity of dealing with the commonplace activities of the students here on campus. The essays will be printed in the Free Europe Press and

distributed throughout the communist dominated countries, so it is necessary that they be written in very clear and simple English in order that they may be easily translated into different languages.

The students in the Iron Curtain countries are especially interested in the freedoms which we take for granted, said Miss Fischer, and it is those things which should be emphasized in the essay.

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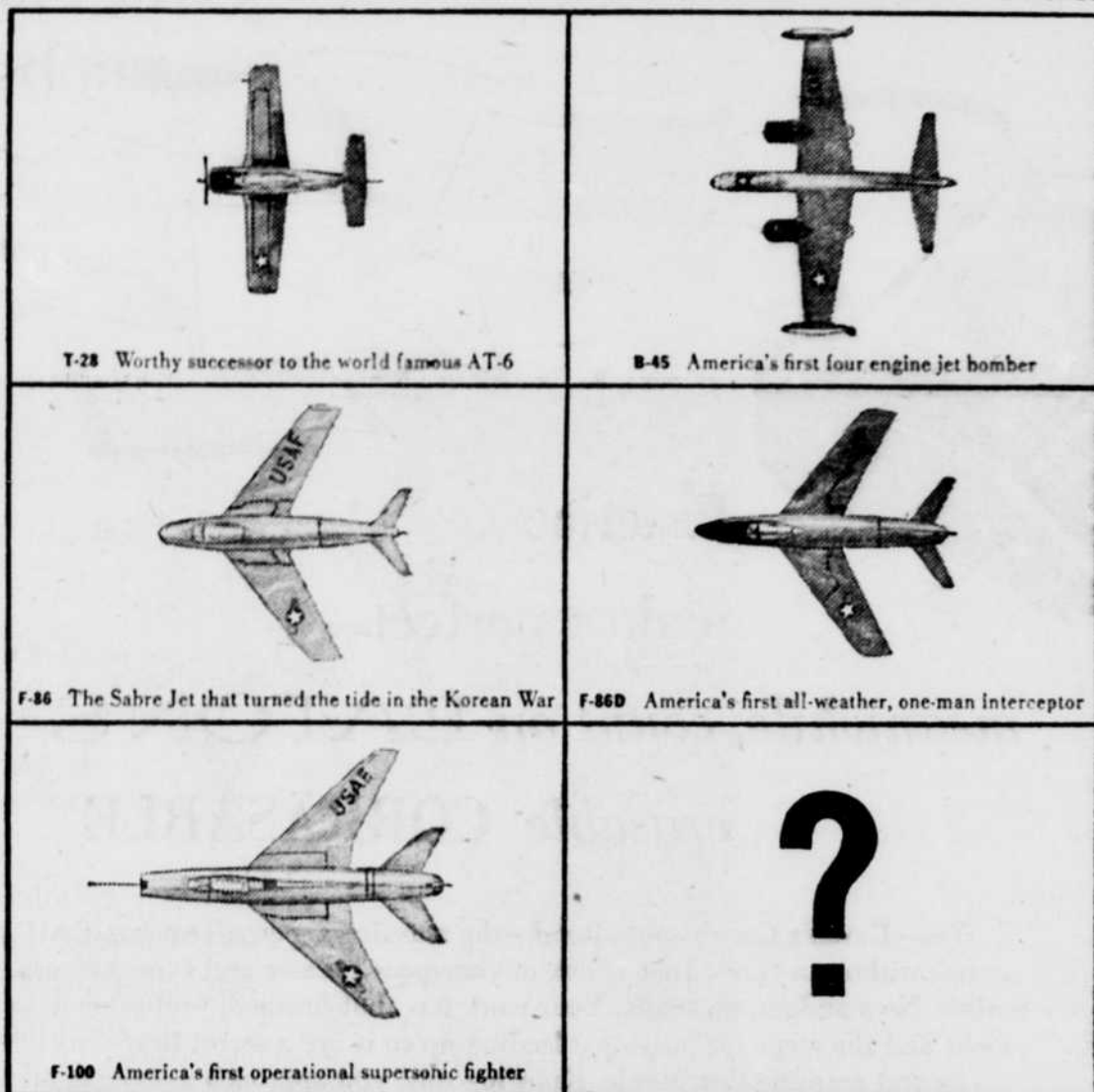


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
